El Toro Memorial Park – Program begins at 11:00 a.m. 25751 Trabuco Road, Lake Forest


Anaheim Cemetery – Program begins at 11:00 a.m. 1400 E. Sycamore St., Anaheim

The observances at each cemetery will feature a range of guest speakers, performances of patriotic music, color guards, honor guard firing salutes, and beautiful wreath presentations.

The program at Santa Ana Cemetery is organized by the Tri-City Memorial Day Committee and features a Parade of Flags as well as several Cannon Salutes that take place throughout the program. The event is staged at the Soldiers' Monument near the entrance of Santa Clara Avenue where Decoration Day/Memorial Day has been honored every year since 1881.

Anaheim Cemetery's Memorial Day program is coordinated by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3173 and American Legion Post 72. The event takes place on the steps of the community mausoleum.

El Toro Memorial Park's program is organized by the Daughters of the American Revolution - Mission Viejo Chapter, American Legion Post 862, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 6024, and the Freedom Committee. This year's program will feature several musical selections performed by the

### Staff Attends California Association of Public Cemeteries (CAPC) **Local Area Meeting at North County Cemetery District**

Twice a year the California Association of Public Cemeteries (CAPC) holds local area meetings at different public cemetery districts across the region. The purpose of these meetings is to share information, discuss common issues and solutions, and gain training and knowledge on a variety of topics impacting the operations of public cemeteries.

The most recent gathering was held on April 12th at Oak Hill Memorial Park in Escondido which is one of two cemeteries operated by North County Cemetery District. Those attending from the Orange County Cemetery District included: General Manager, Tim Deutsch; El Toro Memorial Park Cemetery Manager, Bud Bales; Anaheim Cemetery Lead Worker, Andrew Trejo; and the District's Board Chair, Kelly Rivers - who is also a CAPC's Board Director.

The program featured a tour of Oak Hill Memorial Park by General Manager, Dennis Shepard who also gave a brief history of the grounds. Jasmine Ball and Elias Saade of Foresters Financial gave a presentation on retirement planning and financial management for

public employees. Shawn Robinson of Lounsbery, Ferguson, Altona & Peak spoke on liability concerns for cemetery districts. Other topics discussed at the meeting included: alternative sources for District revenue generation; a recap of the recent CACP Annual Conference, and a time for networking.

#### Orange County Cemetery District Prepares 2018-19 Budget

Each spring District staff prepares a proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year that the Board of Trustees reviews. The budget presents projections for revenues and expenses and provides a spending plan which is a key accountability tool for management. The budget also considers upcoming capital improvements, staffing levels, equipment purchases, and special events such as Memorial Day Programs, Historical Tours, and Dia de los Muertos.

At this time, the Board will also consider any adjustments to the District's Master Fee Schedule. Any recommended changes to our prices and fees will be posted at all locations for thirty days before the new rates go in to effect.

Staff will present the full budget to the Board for its review at either the June or July Board meeting. Once approved, a copy of the full budget will be posted on the District website.

## Santa Ana Closes More Roads to Create New Interment Space



The staff at Santa Ana Cemetery is now in the process of converting two cemetery roads into additional interment space. As you enter the main entrance of the cemetery from Santa Clara Ave., the roads being closed are located between Sections N and X and between Sections O and I, to the left and right as you approach the Garden of the Pines and the new niche feature.

Demolition and disposal of the asphalt has been completed. Over the next few weeks, staff will reroute sprinkler lines, prepare the soil, and plant new grass seed. The District estimates that approximately 378 additional full casket spaces will be created through the closure of these roads. It will take some time for the newly planted lawn to be mature enough for pedestrian traffic. Staff estimates that these spaces will be available for sale sometime in July.

Please remember, due to the limited amount of available interment space at Santa Ana Cemetery, full casket spaces are only being sold to families who have an immediate need for burial. Pre-need sales for full casket interment spaces are only available at El Toro Memorial Park.

## El Toro Memorial Park Eliminates Flower Storage Area

Effective with the May 23rd full-park clean-up, which marks the end of the Mothers' Day holiday schedule, staff at El Toro Memorial Park will no longer save items left on gravesites and store them at the flower pick-up location. Beginning on this date, all items left on gravesites will be discarded at every full-park clean-up. During the week of May 14th the flower removal area by the maintenance yard will be permanently removed.

This change in policy is taking place primarily for two reasons. As the park fills with interments, there is an increasing number of items left on the grounds. Physically, there is not enough room to store all viable items left on gravesites. Nor is it fair to ask staff to attempt to pick and choose which items to keep and which items to discard. Furthermore, despite signs urging people not to steal, the flower pick-up location has become a hub for thieves who

feel that all items left there are fair game. Unfortunately, theft from gravesites is also an increasing problem and cannot be effectively policed by staff. We urge families not to leave anything of great monetary or sentimental value unattended in the park. The District cannot maintain the security of these items.

We also ask visitors to please respect our policy of only decorating gravesites with two items. This includes the use of the in-ground flower vase and one other item. When gravesites are overloaded with decorations it makes mowing and trimming extremely difficult. The only exception to this is for new burials with casket sprays and other flower arrangements that have been transported here for Memorial Services. These items will be left until the fresh flowers wilt. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in these matters.

#### **Update on El Toro Niche Project and Restroom Remodels**

In the last newsletter, the District announced the award of contract for the construction of a beautiful, new niche feature at El Toro Memorial Park, as well as District-wide renovations to improve the office restrooms and provide easier public access to them at Santa Ana Cemetery and Anaheim Cemetery. At the time, we thought the project would be well underway by May. However, there were delays with the City of Lake Forest requesting additional parking studies, getting grading approval, and submitting a water quality plan.

During that time, El Toro Memorial Park staff removed some of the landscaping that would impede the construction of the niches and the new public restroom. Welding repair work has been completed on the wrought iron fencing that sits above the project site and around the perimeter of the flag pole area.

We now expect work to begin on all projects sometime during the month of May. We anticipate that the work will run throughout the summer with final completion in the early fall. There is a possibility that the current public restroom at El Toro Memorial Park will be demolished prior to the Memorial Day Program. Should that occur, portable toilets will be made available for visitors. We appreciate your patience during this construction project. Thank you!

#### Flower Removal and Holiday Schedule



Every Wednesday, groundskeepers remove and discard flowers and decorations throughout all three cemeteries. Families are encouraged to remove their flowers or decorations on Tuesday night; you can then place the flowers back on the space on Wednesday afternoon. Please remember that the District policy only allows for two items to be placed on gravesites. This includes the in-ground flower vase and one other item. If gravesites exceed the number of allowed items, staff may remove and discard the excess items. Please do not leave items of great monetary or sentimental value on gravesites as the District cannot prevent theft.

The District permits the allowed two items of flowers and/or decorations to be left on gravesites during holidays or for special occasions, such as anniversaries, birthdays and for new interments. Please come to the cemetery office and let us know that you have a special occasion and request that the flowers and decorations be left on the space. We do ask that you empty the vase and place fresh water in the container every four to five days to eliminate mosquito breeding sources, which can cause serious health issues. Your cooperation in this regard is greatly appreciated.

In honor of Mothers' Day, flowers may be placed on gravesites beginning on Thursday, May, 3<sup>rd</sup> until Tuesday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>. For Memorial Day, flowers may be placed on Thursday, May 24<sup>th</sup> until Tuesday, June 5<sup>th</sup>. For Fathers' Day, flowers may be placed on gravesites beginning on Thursday, June, 7<sup>th</sup> until Tuesday, June 26<sup>th</sup>.

"Expect the service to be bossy but sweet," he writes of the restaurant, located at 8566 Westminster Blvd. that he notes has the best beef-and-scallion pancake and best honey walnut shrimp in Orange County.

Garden Grove makes the Top 20 with two entries, including Ta Chen, which Johnson notes bills itself as a Szechuan and Mandarin restaurant, though the latter is where it really shines. Best bets include the house special "dry braised beef" and Brainiac's favorite, mu shu pork rolls "as big as footballs." You'll find it at 6082 Chapman Ave.

Also in Garden Grove, you'll find Tan Cang Newport Seafood at 10541 Bolsa Ave., which apparently does a fantastic wok-fried lobster. "Take some friends," Johnson says. "Order the 7-pound platter of Newport Special lobster." Well, OK, if we must!

And finally, we'll give you a Chinese spot in Fountain Valley. Fu Wing Low, at 16545 Brookhurst St., is a throwback kind of place, Johnson says, noting it reminds him of the '80s movie "Big Trouble In Little China" and serves all that good stuff you remember from classic Chinese joints: Mongolian beef, egg drop soup and beef chow fun are, well, fun!

## It's curtains for Shakespeare for 2018

Lovers of the arts will have to hold their collective breath and hope that they've not lost yet another theater in Orange County.

Patrons of Shakespeare Orange County, the resident theatrical troupe for Garden Grove's Festival Amphitheater may be shocked to discover that the award-winning group has announced that they will have to shutter their scheduled annual summer season, due to planned construction at the venue by the new operators.

In an email to subscribers and an announcement on the shakespeareoc.org (http://shakespeareoc.org/) website, SOC Producing Artistic Director John Walcutt cushioned the blow with good news first, such as the group being awarded the California Arts Commission' Local Impact Award, tripling its audience in the last four seasons, and partnering with the Orange County School of The Arts in creating youth programs for Orange County students and young adults.

Then the bad news dropped.

Due to construction on the theater by the new tenant — the LFA Group (Large Format Assemblies) — as it works to increase seating in the amphitheater and upgrade the concessions stand (as well as the sound and lighting systems as reported by the Tribune in January 2017, "More seats at the Festival Amphitheater?" [https://orangecountytribune.com/2017/01/11/more-seating-for-the-festival-amphitheater/] (https://orangecountytribune.com/2017/01/11/more-seating-for-the-festival-amphitheater/%5D)), there is not even the opportunity for an abbreviated summer season for SOC at the venue.

"They (the City partners) have made it clear that we cannot be open for business if construction is underway, nor can they offer us any options in pushing our season a bit later in the summer," announced Walcutt in the email to theatergoers. "We have no reasonable and responsible choice, but to pull the plug on our productions this summer at the Amphitheatre. To proceed would be reckless, endangering our financial security and jeopardizing our professional product. I can't tell you how disappointed I am."

Now listed online as the "Garden Amp" and looking to appeal to a younger demographic with shows such as the "High and Mighty Festival" and "Not Yo' Mama's Ska Show", the location is described as "an all-ages, open air venue... Previously known as the Festival Amphitheater or Strawberry Bowl, the venue has become a premiere location for concerts and events in Orange County." A portion of the facility has also been transformed into a smaller venue for bands, called "The Locker Room."

Concerning the situation with SOC, John Montanchez, Director of Community Affairs for Garden Grove, explained "There's new operators there at the theater, the LFA group... there's construction currently on the snack bar, trying to convert it to a restaurant, and what I feel it comes down to is that Shakespeare Orange County feels a little uncomfortable with the timeline on all of that, because they're looking to do their annual fundraiser at the Strawberry Festival... because of construction, the timeline was going to be tight, that they were uncomfortable enough to say... 'we'll step back for the summer, but we'll definitely want to look at the options of coming back next year.' We [the city] are actually possibly looking at doing some smaller stuff with them during the summer at another location... this is all preliminary right now, we're just discussing if they could possibly do a children's kind of camp or something like that — we're working currently right now on possibly finding a location for that."

Garden Grove City Manager Scott Stiles, whom Walcutt acknowledged in his announcement as having been greatly supportive of Shakespeare Orange County, had this to say:

"We understand that ongoing construction and renovation work with kitchen and bathroom facilities at the Festival Amphitheater, along with operational and cost concerns, are causing SOC to take a break from their summer programming for July and August 2018... we certainly wish to encourage creative partnerships going forward with SOC, the city, and LFA, who serves as the City's Amphitheater management company. We are excited about the potential for future partnerships with SOC and the arts community."

Remarking to the Tribune, Walcutt said "Yes, we are all terribly disappointed and were completely blindsided. SOC was promised the theater this summer and was in the process of launching our season. There are may great things happening in Garden Grove right now, and in this particular case, we were squeezed out... we were left with no responsible choice but to step aside. We hope that this will provide the City and LFA the chance to get their ducks in order, complete some nice improvements on the Amphitheater and support SOC in future. We are grateful to the people of Garden Grove for their support — of all Orange County really, thank you. And we hope the City will focus on making SOC a priority down the road."

Focusing on the positive, he concluded "Meantime, we will catch our breath, proceed with this summer's education programs [for kids and students], and consider the options."

#### THE BAD NEWS

Unfortunately, our City partners have not been as engaged and have struggled to keep up. It is with great sadness and disappointment that we have to notify you that our 2018 season of productions at The Amphitheatre has just been cancelled due to construction and permitting delays relating to refurbishing the theatre. SOC will not have its steady place at The Strawberry Festival, which is our major annual fundraiser, and construction has been delayed to the point that SOC can't be guaranteed by the City that our season will be unaffected. They have made it clear that we cannot be open for business if construction is underway, nor can they offer us any options in pushing our season a bit later in the summer. This is due to their obligations to LFA, the new tenant at The Amphitheatre. So, we have no reasonable and responsible choice, but to pull the plug on our productions this summer at the Amphitheatre. To proceed would be reckless, endangering our financial security and jeopardizing our professional product. I can't tell you how disappointed I am. This was all just relayed to us at a City meeting.

#### THIS SEASON

Our intention, at this point, as we consider alternatives, is to find locations to produce both our High School Intensive project and our Young Actors' Project (with Theater Seoul of South Korea) in July. We'd like to keep at least those alive this summer. As far as our larger productions go, we are, with deep regret, suspending those pending further notice, and we will see what the future brings. Everything is up in the air right now, as we try our best to deal with this. We are so sorry.

#### YOU, OUR COMMUNITY

In an article in THE OC REGISTER (December 21, 2014), after Tom Bradac had given me the honor of taking SOC on and building on his 35+ years of work here, and in which THE REGISTER graciously named me one of its Most Influential People in The Arts, I said "We really need to find out if the City of Garden Grove wants to be a part of this..." As myself and this wonderful group of talented volunteers from outside Garden Grove took on the challenge of extending the life of SOC at this Amphitheatre, which we all loved, that was the question on all our minds. It seemed so clear to us what SOC could be in Garden Grove. I think the community at large has rallied around us. And we thank you for that.

The civic leadership has been more challenging. Garden Grove has a terrific new City Manager in Scott Stiles, and many exciting things are happening around the City. Mr. Stiles has proven a supporter of SOC in his time here, but he faces many challenges, his plate is very full, and is only one person. All of SOC thanks him for his effort on our part.



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## Retorts: Many great GG neighborhoods

No good deed goes unpunished.

That's clear from this week's reaction to Garden Grove City Councilman (and mayor pro tem) Kris Beard's latest initiative. He wrote a proposed resolution to declare that part of the Big Strawberry west of Western Avenue to be

"West Grove."

Beard wrote – among other things – that the west side has "long demonstrated a profound sense of community pride so distinct, they identify the area as 'West Garden Grove' with the affinity and the character of a small, family-oriented, hard-working, middle-class, 'All American hometown.'"

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/retorts.jpg)Hmmm. Not bad, unless you stop to wonder how that part of the city differs from the rest of Garden Grove.

Some folks even read "All American" as code words for "mostly white folks," which was certainly not what Mr. Beard intended. At Tuesday's city council meeting he took his lumps and promised to come back with a better resolution in May.

However, let's not let some few awkward phrases disregard the idea on its general merits, or the lack thereof.

Essentially what Beard is proposing is to create a "brand" for the west side and now emphasize the virtues and sense of community over there. This isn't a bad idea. Many large cities – and Garden Grove, believe it or not, is turning into one – have celebrated the charm of different neighborhoods which make a municipality more than just a bunch of tract homes.

The issue, as I see it, is that Beard "walked point" on the concept of working toward boosting such recognition. It's an important role, but those are the guys who usually run a risk.

A better approach to consider might be to use this idea as the seed of a bigger concept. Mayor Steve Jones says he is seeking to build a more unified community, but the two concepts are not mutually exclusive. The national motto is (or should be) "e pluribus unum," meaning "out of many, one."

I am imagining a marketing campaign, complete with colorful signage promoting, for example, "West Grove: Another Great Garden Grove Neighborhood."

Other candidates would include Downtown, Little Saigon, Koreatown, and Grove Resort as starters. You could make a pretty good case for other areas such as Brookhurst/Chapman (the city's chief commercial center), East Side (east of the resort) and other places as it seems appropriate.


None of this conflicts with the city's "Garden Grove Is Your Market" campaign. Few successful enterprises use the same ad approach forever, or aim at a too-specific demographic. "Market" is aimed largely at making businesses comfortable with Garden Grove as a site location; "Great Neighborhoods" would aim at making existing and potential residents feel better about the city as hometown.

Maybe all the acid kicked up by this mini-tempest can have a soothing result. Celebrate all the good stuff. To paraphrase an old educational fad, "Leave No Neighborhood Behind."





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## Beard will rework "West Grove" resolution

Garden Grove Councilman Kris Beard's proposal to give the western part of the city its own brand as "West Grove" will be getting a bit of a shave.

At Tuesday's meeting of the council, the District 1 councilman heard some harsh words, as well as encouragement, from members of the public on a resolution that Beard proposed.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/gg-logo\_lg.jpg)The resolution would recognize that area west of Western Avenue as a part of the city that has "long demonstrated a profound sense of community pride so distinct, they identify the area as 'West Garden Grove' with the affinity and the character of a small, family-oriented, hard-working, middle-class, 'All American hometown."

But on social media, as well as Tuesday night in person, his wording drew some hard words.

Lena Nguyen said that although he believed Beard had good intentions, "there could have been a better way to word it," arguing that the text would "separate the city." Those complaining about the draft resolution said the wording seemed to imply that West Garden Grove was somehow more "All American" than other, more racially diverse parts of the city.

But Beard had his backers, including son Alex Beard, who told the council that the branding effort would be beneficial for economic development of the area. Another speaker compared West Garden Grove favorably to the rest of the city, which drew some grumbling from the audience.

Beard defended his handiwork. "This is a draft resolution," he said. "I asked for it [public input] and I got it. I don't intend to submit the resolution as it is."

He said he didn't mean to be critical of other parts of Garden Grove and that he was a supporter of all parts of the city. Beard promised to replace "controversial words" with better language and bring a resolution back later, perhaps in May.

Also at the meeting, the council voted 7-0 in favor of an amended agreement for the development of a new Nickelodeon-themed hotel on Harbor Boulevard with a one-year time extension.

Additionally, the council approved a general plan amendment and planned unit development for the completion of the project popularly known as "the rusty skeleton." The mixed-use housing and retail enterprise at 10800 Garden Grove Blvd., west of Brookhurst Street, will include 400 senior citizen housing units.

The next meeting of the city council is planned for May 8.

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## New "Village Center" gets final OK

A PLAN to revive the dormant and mostly vacant Village Center at Beach and Garden Grove boulevards has been approved by the Garden Grove City Council (Frontier Real Estate).

A mixed use center straddling the Garden Grove and Stanton city limits which may revitalize a long-dormant stretch of Beach Boulevard has won approval from the Garden Grove Planning Commission.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/gg-logo\_lg.ipg)On Thursday, April 19, the panel voted 5-0 (with two members absent) in favor of a site plan and other measures to clear the way for a revived "Village Center," located on the west side of Beach and north of Garden Grove Boulevard.

The Village Center, which dates back to 1980, has 4.1 acres on the Garden Grove side (north of Garden Grove Boulevard, on the west of Beach Boulevard) out of the total of 21.87 acres.

Under the plan for the entire site, the northern 11.89-acre portion (all within Stanton) will be devoted to residential development. The remaining part – 10.18 acres – will include 6.08 acres on the Stanton side.

Changes planned for the center include renovation of facades and interiors of the remaining retail and commercial spaces and the addition of two new pad buildings.



The Stanton Planning Commission has already approved the site plan, variance and tentative parcel map.

At its peak, the center hosted an Edwards movie complex, a Ralphs supermarket and a Sav-On drug store as well as Red Robin, Acapulco, Sizzler, Mimi's and Wendy's restaurants.



it.

"Most Americans may not know a lot about Vietnamese Americans," said Linda Vo, an Asian American studies professor at UC Irvine and co-curator of the exhibition.

"People know the Vietnam War, and most of the time, that story is told from the American side. We wanted to tell it from a different perspective and have the American public understand what happened to Viets who had to go through a civil war. We wanted to show who we were during the war, and in the 40-plus years since the war officially ended. It's an American story, and it is about American history."

More than 2 million Vietnamese live in the United States, according to 2016 statistics from the U.S. Census Bureau. The biggest population of Vietnamese outside Vietnam is in Orange County, totaling about 184,153, or 6.1% of the county's popu-

lation.

While many Vietnamese remember the odyssey of immigrating to a new, not always welcoming land, subsequent generations don't always know about their parents' journeys and struggles.

"For the younger ones, this exhibition is to expose them to this part of their history that they don't always learn about," said Tram Le, co-cura-

tor of "Viet Stories."

She also serves as an arts and culture specialist for the city of Santa

"They didn't have to go through a war or hunger," Le said. "They're just blown away that their parents survived it."

The idea for "Viet Stories" originated years ago, when Vo and Le

were organizing a Vietnamese American oral history project out of UC Irvine. From that project came a book, "Vietnamese in Orange County," released in 2015 by Arcadia Publishing.

"Viet Stories" also has roots in another exhibition, "Vietnamese Focus: Generations of Stories," on view at the Old Orange County Courthouse from August 2015 through February 2016. Some of the historical panels and banners are borrowed from that show.

This iteration at the Nixon Library and Museum features many more artists, artifacts and objects, including two haunting collages of black and white photographs by Dinh Q. Lê; a dress custom-designed for Jennifer Lopez by Bao Tranchi; striking paintings of Amerasians by Thuy Linh Bennett Kang; and a red evening gown designed for actress Kelly Marie Tran by Huntington Beach-based designer Thai Nguyen. Tran played rebel Rose Tico in "Star Wars: The Last Jedi," and wore the red dress to the movie premiere.

Tiffany Le, who was born and raised in Orange County, has about eight of her mixed media works on

display.

"To be alongside these other distinguished Vietnamese American artists is both a proud moment and a humbling experience," said Le, 27, a Garden Grove resident.

"I've read, written [about] and followed a lot of these artists during my university days, and to showcase with them is an honor I didn't expect, especially through the lens as a second-generation Vietnamese American"

Organizers and some participants acknowledge that having "Viet Stories" on view at the Nixon Library and Museum does involve some ironic undertones.

While American involvement in the Vietnam War officially ended during the Nixon Administration, the 37th president did approve secret bombing campaigns in North Vietnam and Cambodia, and ground incursions in Laos and Cambodia during the war.

"The Nixon Library approached us, and wanted to do it on a bigger scale with professional space and staff," Vo

said.


"We expanded it greatly."

"Politically, we need to be at that table," Tram Le said. "We need to tell our side of the story. Nixon's legacy is one side. We need to tell that other side. Never once did they tell us, 'Don't say that.'"

The organizers also believe that telling this story of Vietnamese immigration to the U.S. is relevant to issues confronting the country today.

"It resonates with what's going on today, with Syrian refugees and other refugees around the world," Vo said. "It's an important historical moment when we are rethinking our policy. This puts a human face on it."

### Musical magic at Gem with "Patsy"

It's a story of friendship, respect, ambition, and above all - the music.

By popular demand, "Always, Patsy Cline" is back for a limited time at the Gem Theater in Garden Grove: telling the true-life story of the friendship that evolved between Louise Seger, a divorced single mom in Houston, Texas, and her idol, the rising country music starlet Patsy Cline, when the two cross paths at a concert where the performer is featuring.



(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/08/stagereviewbug.jpg)Louise (played by Dee Shandera) narrates this trip down memory lane, as she relates how one morning in 1957 as she was making breakfast, she was struck by the singing she heard eminating from a variety show her kids were watching, featuring the up-and-coming star Patsy Cline (Nicole Cassesso): she's immediately smitten with Patsy's talent and striking, melodic voice, and it becomes a life-long love affair with her music.

A few years later, when the devoted and fervent fan is giddy to hear that her idol is coming to perform locally in Houston, there's nothing on Earth that will stop her from attending — and when she meets the star before the show, not only is Patsy warm and friendly, but even heads to Louise's table to sit, drink and dish with the star-struck fan.

The story of that special evening and the ongoing friendship between the pair is related in-between numerous favorite tunes by the singer, as the audience shares in the treasured true-life memories of a devoted admirer.

A jukebox musical like "Always, Patsy Cline" doesn't return for a third year without being wildly popular, and the show has proved to be a favorite at the Gem, both for the audience and the cast: both Cassesso and Shandera shine in their reprised roles — it's understandable why there would be such demand for its return. When Louise relates their conversation about marital troubles, it's not just about one woma's troubles, but about the challenges faced in every relationship that's worth saving. When the women sit and shoot the breeze over Schlitz beers, it's more than the idol-worship of a devoted fan, it's two kindred spirits in a finite, yet timeless, crystallized moment, that speaks to something deeper and universal.



While this may be the third and arguably final year for the popular "Patsy" – all the more reason to catch it while you can, mind you – who's to say what the future may bring, and if the audience's love demands it return next season.


Either way, "Always, Patsy Cline" – as well as the comical Shandera and scintillating Cassesso – is not to be missed.

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### Shepherd's Grove moves to Irvine

The last remnant of a worldwide religious ministry that began in Garden Grove has left the Big Strawberry and settled in Irvine.

Shepherd's Grove, the descendent of the Crystal Cathedral congregation founded by Rev. Robert H. Schuller, left its campus at the former St. Callistus church and school in March and relocated to the Irvine Presbyterian Church in that South Orange County city.


The congregation was displaced because the land and buildings it rented from the Catholic Diocese of Orange County were sold to Shea Homes, which will build a gated 80-home single-family development at the northwest corner of Garden Grove Boulevard and Lewis Street.

According to the Shepherd's Grove website – www.shepherdsgrove.org (http://www.shepherdsgrove.org/) – the church will be changing its affiliation from the Reformed Church of America to the Presbyterian Church of America.

The church was founded in 1955 as the Garden Grove Community Church. It gained fame as the "drive-in church" where worshippers could "come as you are" to services at a nearby drive-in theater or at the sanctuary.

Broadcasts of the "Hour of Power" televised services made Rev. Schuller an international celebrity. The church campus at Chapman Avenue and Lewis Street expanded rapidly with the construction of a high-rise tower. In 1980, the new name for the congregation became the Crystal Cathedral, in recognition of its iconic new glass sanctuary.

However, by the early part of the new century, attendance began to decline and the operation suffered from financial trouble that led to filing for bankruptcy in 2010 and the sale

of the Cathedral and campus to the diocese. In 2013 the former Crystal Cathedral congregation relocated and changed its name to Shepherd's Grove. It is now led by Rev. Bobby Schuller, grandson of the church's founder.

The former Crystal Cathedral is now referred to as Christ Cathedral and is being renovated for its new role as the center of the diocese. Kevin Vann is the bishop.

The revised agreement would extend the timeline for construction on the 9.08-acre site by one year, allowing time to acquire adjacent properties – including single family homes and an apartment complex – and relocate the residents.

Kam Sang will contribute \$13 million in project costs: another \$5 million is being sought, with possible funding from Nickelodeon.

The council meets at 6:30 pm. in its chambers in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave. (at Euclid Street).

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### Nonprofits serving homeless people in Orange County aim for \$500,000 in online 'Giving Day' fundraiser

At the stroke of midnight on Wednesday, April 25, watch for the social media accounts of 16 Orange County organizations that serve homeless men, women and children to go into overdrive when another Giving Day of virtual fundraising kicks into action.

The marathon online donation drive introduced here by Orange County Community Foundation in 2015 — called iheartOC — has been a smashing success. But this year, there's a twist.

Instead of one daylong virtual event for hundreds of participating nonprofits soliciting donations for their myriad charitable missions all at the same time, the 2018 version will involve multiple Giving Days spread over the course of the next year or so. Each 24-hour online fundraiser will focus on a specific cause or group of people — homelessness, people with disabilities, senior citizens — and engage a collaborative group of nonprofits that provide services to those populations.

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The first is the Help Them Home campaign to support 16 nonprofits that assist homeless people in different parts of the county: American Family Housing; Casa Teresa; Family Assistance Ministries; Families Forward; Family Promise of Orange County; Grandma's House of Hope; HIS House; HomeAid OC; Mercy House; Orange County Community Housing Corp.; Pathways of Hope; Project Hope Alliance; South County Outreach; SPIN; Thomas House Family Shelter; and WISEPlace women's shelter.

The collective goal: \$500,000.

Donations can be made to a specific organization, or to the Help Them Home campaign in general to be distributed evenly among the 16 nonprofits. Some supporters have already stepped up with offers to match targeted amounts of donations.

Working with the nonprofit fundraising platform Funraise, Orange County Community Foundation has set up a landing page at <a href="help-them-home.funraise.org">help-them-home.funraise.org</a> to go live at midnight Wednesday. Progress can be tracked in real time on the site.

The idea for the collaborative Giving Day grew out of a smaller effort last year among Families Forward, HomeAid OC and Thomas House.

After raising more than \$1.8 million for 347 nonprofits in 2015 and then \$3.2 million for 418 charities in 2016, iheartOC went on hiatus in 2017 so OCCF could retool the technology and promotional materials.

But Families Forward, HomeAid and Thomas House engaged with the foundation to help with a tightly focused Giving Day for them.

Thomas House executive director Natalie Julien said fundraising through iheartOC had been so beneficial that the nonprofit reached out to Orange County Community Foundation last year to figure out some way to keep that momentum going.

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"We didn't want to stop," said Julien, in charge of a 32-year-old Garden Grove nonprofit that operates a 16-unit apartment complex where about 35 families a year find transitional shelter from the streets or motels. With a host of support services, Thomas House has a nearly 90 percent success rate assisting its clients in finding and improving employment prospects, saving money, and moving on to self-sufficiency.

Orange County Community Foundation facilitated the collaboration with HomeAid and Families Forward for a mini Giving Day last year.

The three nonprofits exceeded goals of raising \$50,000 each. Including dollar-for-dollar matching donations, the individual amounts raised were: HomeAid, \$91,320; Thomas House, \$70,227; and Families Forward, \$66,240.

"They were all cheering each other on," said Carol Ferguson, senior donor relations and programs officer at OCCF who manages the Giving Day project.

The effort, involving ramped-up social media outreach and cross promotion among the three participating nonprofits, exponentially increased the one-day fundraising for Thomas House from \$8,000 and \$13,000 in 2015 and 2016, respectively, Julien said.

"Hopefully, again we'll exceed expectations," she said of the \$50,000 goal for the upcoming Giving Day, which has already resulted in a \$7,500 match challenge from Wahoo's Fish Taco and another \$10,000 challenge from an undisclosed individual.

There could be as many as 12 different Giving Days when all is said and done, said Shelley Hoss, president of Orange County Community Foundation, which is providing the online Giving Day platform, seed money and other support for promotional efforts.

The four other monthly events scheduled through August:

- May 31: Empowering Possibilities: A Giving Day for OC Neighbors with Disabilities (nine organizations; \$175,000 goal)
- June 14: veterans and military (11 organizations; \$75,000 goal)
- July 11: seniors (five organizations; \$80,000 goal)
- Aug. 15: Boys and Girls Clubs of Orange County (15 organizations; \$137,000 goal)

Said Hoss: "We hope the nonprofits come forward with proposals for other Giving Days."

# Can tea business, community both win when customers pay what they want?

Friends called Robert Hoang and Truong Kim downright crazy when they heard about their plan.

Hoang's own mother, a seamstress refugee from Vietnam, cried when he told her. The world is evil, she said, begging him not to do it.

But Hoang and Kim hold the opposite view. The world is inherently good. People are inherently good.

And that is why they just wiped the prices off their menu at Milk Box, their boba milk tea shops in Tustin and Mission Viejo.

As of two months ago, if you walk up to a Milk Box and order a jasmine iced tea topped with sea salt cream or a vanilla rose matcha on ice and ask how much you owe, the cashier will tell you to just "contribute what you can." Walking away without coughing up a single cent is an option.

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Most customers are completely thrown off and ask the cashier what they should pay. They are told that the suggested price is \$4, a smidge more than what it costs to make the drink.

So far about 70 percent of customers find that fair. Fifteen percent pay less. Another fifteen percent hand over more. Sometimes a lot more. One woman paid \$100 for her cup of tea in Tustin.

People are hungry to see the good in humanity, Hoang and Kim believe. They're hungry for good news. In fact, the partners are in the process of changing the name Milk Box to Good News.

"There's a lot of hopelessness in the news," Hoang says. "We thought, 'What can we do with a cup of tea to spark compassion?"

If you're one of those doubters, shaking your head, then wait until you hear this. The idea came to them after a major league tea company approached them at the end of 2017 and offered to buy them out.

It was enough money, Hoang said, to retire his parents and put his kids (5 and 8) through college someday.

"But we just couldn't sleep at night," he said. "We kept thinking about our staff (45 employees who would have lost their jobs). Our vision was to be peoplecentered."

So they turned the buyout fortune down and instead came up with a new model that included deleting their prices and then splitting whatever profits they got with their staff.

You can see now why Hoang's mom Mui cried.

"I told her, 'You raised me to have compassion and give back," Hoang says. "I'm giving 50 percent to my staff; they get to own something that you never got a chance to do."

His mom told him that was all very nice, "but the world isn't fair. You work hard, keep your head down and don't ask questions. You will get back what the world thinks you deserve."

To understand that conversation you must understand the backstory. Both Hoang's and Kim's parents are Vietnam refugees.

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Kim's parents escaped Vietnam, arriving in Garden Grove in 1977. He was born the next year, one of five kids. Today his mom Lisa is a hairdresser and his dad Ken owns an air conditioning company. But back then, "we were really poor."

"We know what it's like to have nothing," Hoang says.

His mom was the last of her family to flee their farm in Vietnam during the fall of Saigon. A neighbor put her on his already overloaded boat. When she began vomiting during the crossing, others lobbied to throw her overboard, but the neighbor wouldn't let them. The boat was rescued the next day.

Mui settled in Covina and married. When Hoang was 7 his dad left. His mom raised her three children alone, working in a garment factory.

"I tell her, 'Mom, all your sacrifices, I want the world to know, are not going to go to waste," Hoang says.

Hoang and Kim became friends at Cal State Fullerton. Later, Hoang went to work as a fraud investigator and Kim became an information security engineer.

Disillusioned with the paths they had chosen, the two hatched a plan to go into business together in 2014. The idea was to take the popular milk tea cafe concept to the next level with all-natural ingredients, no syrups or powders. Kim, who is now 39, quit his six-figure job, sold his house for investment money and moved back home to Garden Grove.

"I went all in," he says.

Hoang, 40, works as a fraud investigator. The greed and corruption he sees daily on that job are part of what drives him. So is his faith. Hoang is a member of Bethel Church in Irvine. Kim is a member of St. Columban Catholic Church in Garden Grove.

"The heart of it is compassion," Kim says. "We find fulfillment by helping people. You know how you feel when you give someone a present? That's how I feel every day."

The partners are hoping their philosophy is contagious.

"We're teaching our staff not to judge if someone pays nothing or a penny," Hoang says. "To have empathy. You don't know their story."

They also ask their staff to donate at least 10 percent of their portion of the profits each month.

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"We want to empower our staff," Hoang says.

The employees decide as a team where to send their donation. Currently, it's water filters for storm-ravaged Puerto Rico.

For those who still see head-in-the-cloud hippies on the road to ruin, note that they aren't the first ones to try this. There is a smattering of cafes with no prices, including a UK chain called the Real Junk Food Project, popping up around the world. Enough that there's a name for this: The Pay What You Want (PWYW) model.

Steve Snook, owner of Metropolis Cafe, a bustling coffee shop in Santa Monica, deleted his menu prices six months ago.

"It's been really cool," Snook says. "It really hasn't changed (the bottom line), and yet we have opened the door to customers who couldn't come here."

Senior citizens on fixed incomes and the homeless and sidling up to the counter alongside the industry people and the start-up kids, who can, and in many cases do, pay extra for their latte.

"In our neighborhood, people believe in it," Snook says. "It's powerful to do things that help other people."

One woman, who used to pay \$4 for her cup of tea, handed over \$104 the day she learned there were no more prices.

"It's just fun to watch," he says.

Snook is a pastor, and his coffee shop is in the same building as his church. His philosophy is that church isn't just on Sunday.

"Church happens seven days a week," he says. "We gotta lock arms with people who really care about making a difference."

Coffee is just the catalyst.

In the same way, Kim says, that tea is just the vehicle.

"Our mission is people," Kim says. "And really being a part of the community."

## The next big thing in tourism could be Little Saigon

A hotel with French colonial architecture that recalls pre-war Saigon.

A high-end restaurant hall specializing in Asian fusion dishes that please foodies of every possible background.

Upscale retail. Posh apartments. A Hollywood-style walk of fame that honors the gutsy entrepreneurs who built the community.

If most or all of those plans play out, Little Saigon soon could become a tourist hot spot — and not just aging Vietnamese. After decades of slow but steady shifts, most aimed at pleasing Vietnamese-speaking Americans and their children, Little Saigon, the heart of the Vietnamese diaspora in America, is ready for a full-blown transformation into a place that appeals far beyond its own ethnic past, following the path of Little Tokyo, Little Italy and dozens of other immigrant enclaves.

For many, the idea already is sparking a new sense of optimism.

"I'm excited that the private sector is stepping up to the plate to invest in Little Saigon," said Westminster Councilman Tyler Diep.

"If I could play Sim City with the Bolsa Corridor, I'd want to see a downtown, urban area where people can eat; (where) it's lively and vibrant, and it doesn't shut down at 8 p.m."

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The change might not be far off.

In January, Bac Pham, a developer with hotels in Garden Grove and other nearby cities, submitted a 62-page document titled "The Bolsa Row Specific Plan." The plan, submitted to city planners in Westminster, was the first tangible evidence of a hotel that has been talked about for years.

It's as ambitious as it is long: A mixed-use designation for six acres on the southeast corner of Bolsa Avenue and Brookhurst Street, with a 150-room hotel (the area's first); a 250-unit apartment complex, and retail space on the ground floor of both the hotel and apartment complex. The plan also calls for a so-called Festival Row bisecting the development, a pedestrian-friendly strip that could host Southeast Asian summer market nights and similar events.

The architecture, the schematics show, would resemble colonial-era Vietnam, a strong nod to the Vietnam that existed before before the 20-year conflict that split the country, killed millions and, after the fall of Saigon 42 years ago this month, a mass exodus to the United States.

Bac Pham and his wife, Joann, envision Bolsa Row as an homage to their homeland that also "appeals to their children, the second generation of Vietnamese-Americans." The plan calls for "broad arcades, storefront windows and sidewalk seating will create street scenes reminiscent of those in the heart of Old Saigon."

Pham, a reticent first-generation immigrant who built the Hotel Ramada in Garden Grove, said he was not ready to comment on Bolsa Row just yet. But Steve Jones, the mayor of Garden Grove who is working with Pham, described the project in glowing terms.

"There's no financial need for him to open the hotel," Jones said. "He wants to give back to the community."

In mid-March, Jones and two Vietnamese-American entrepreneurs had a breakfast meeting at the Coffee Factory in Westminster. The business owners – Tam Nguyen, who runs Advance Beauty College, started by his father; and Sonny Nguyen, owner of Seven Leaves Café, a burgeoning chain that is hoping to become the Vietnamese Starbucks – are part of the so-called 1.5 generation. Both were born in Vietnam, but came to America when they were so young that they don't remember much about their native country.

Over coffee, eggs and baguettes, they discussed the generational shifts of the Vietnamese community in Orange County, and how those changes figure to reshape Little Saigon.

"The first generation came here with nothing. They opened businesses like dry cleaners and liquor stores to provide a better life for their children," Tam Nguyen said. "The second generation became doctors and lawyers. The third generation, like my children, have more freedom to become artists or entrepreneurs."

Successive generations, they and others said, no longer need Little Saigon to serve as an enclave that provided a cultural safety net to those who didn't speak English and were unaccustomed to American life. To many younger Vietnamese-Americans, Little Saigon can't provide a visceral reminder of Vietnam they never knew.

Many second- and third-generation Vietnamese have moved away from Little Saigon, to places like Fountain Valley, which is now a suburb of the enclave. Like their millennial hipster brethren, they enjoy high-end food and nightlife options that Little Saigon mostly lacks. They are more educated than their first-generation elders, with many holding advanced degrees in business or medicine.

And, critically, younger Vietnamese Americans have non-Vietnamese friends and spouses, creating a need to blend Vietnamese and American cultures.

"They are looking to do things differently," Sonny Nguyen said. "They are going from surviving to thriving."

The result among the business-minded in Little Saigon, Sonny Nguyen said, is an effort to adapt and attract a diverse clientele.

"A lot of our drinks," he said as an example, "are formulated from Vietnamese but are fashioned to attract American people."

And so to sustain itself, Little Saigon must change along with its community.

"I've always had this goal for Vietnamese-Americans to go mainstream," said Frances Nguyen, who in 2009 was the first Vietnamese-American woman to become president of the Westminster Chamber of Commerce. "I want everyone to feel comfortable coming to Little Saigon."

In 1987, Frank Jao, one of the most successful real-estate magnates in the county, opened his pièce-de-résistance: the two-story, pagoda-like Asian Garden Mall. Twenty years later it remains the anchor of the Bolsa commercial district, attracting Vietnamese tourists from other enclaves in San Jose and Houston, hosting the popular Summer Night Market, and blanketing the sky with a cloud of smoke during the Lunar New Year Firecracker Celebration.

But Jao, in semi-retirement, and his daughter Felicia Jao, the heir apparent, are working on another development they hope will infuse Little Saigon with new life: a 20,000 square-foot food hall similar to the popular Anaheim Packing House, about 11 miles to the north.

The development's details are still weeks away from going public (Bridgecreek, Frank Jao's company, is waiting for its architect to return from traveling abroad), but Bridgecreek has a concept plan and Jao said the project should open by the end of 2018.

He and city officials described it as a place that would attract a young, diverse crowd, bringing Little Saigon into the trend of multi-ethnic mingling.

"Little Saigon is moving in that direction, but we are always a little behind," Frank Jao said on Wednesday afternoon, taking a break from vacationing overseas to talk business. "But we hope this is the time to catch up."

The food hall would replace a strip mall to the east of the Asian Garden Mall, currently occupied by a hodgepodge of restaurants and lounges, pharmacies and hair salons that cater primarily to Vietnamese speaking locals.

Frank Jao said the goal is to help relocate some of those businesses and incorporate others.

Christopher Crum, who came to Orange County from Vietnam when he was 17 and spent years in Little Saigon before moving to Orlando, Florida, returned to Westminster last year to open a restaurant.

Lau Xanh Grill, which opened a few months ago in the strip mall, encapsulates the trend of fusing Vietnamese and American culture, said Crum, who is half-Vietnamese and half-British.

It has a large seafood and steak menu that Crum described as Asian fusion. He isn't worried about the food hall displacing him – he cares more about attracting customers.

"We want to make the restaurant an attraction," Crum said. "The area needs to be updated for the younger generation."

Felicia Jao said the food hall is being designed with a similar goal. "We want to provide something to the second and third and upcoming fourth generation that can provide a sense of community, a place everyone can enjoy."

Not everyone is enchanted by the idea. The effort to lure non-Vietnamese speaking visitors could, in the eyes of some, "whitewash" the district.

If so, it'll be a stark change. On any given weekday, a tour of Bolsa highlights how insular the community remains: aging businesses patronized by scores of first-generation Vietnamese Americans who gather at patio tables, smoke cigarettes and chat with friends in Vietnamese. Many elderly still go to Little Saigon's shops for eastern medicine, familiar food and a sense of comfort they can't find in other communities.

"We want to attract the younger generations but at the same time, we have to recognize the contributions of the first generation that came here after the fall of Saigon," said Westminster Mayor Tri Ta. "I want to see balance. Something that satisfies seniors and creates more opportunities for younger people."

Last month, the City Council appointed Ta and newly elected Councilwoman Kimberly Ho to form an ad-hoc committee to figure out how to create a Little Saigon walk of fame. The early concept is to have the names of nominated community members go before a committee to judge whether they are worthy of getting their own star, and then having those selected foot the bill – much the same way the Hollywood Walk of Fame works. The walk would run on the north side of Bolsa.

"It will be a great attraction for the city," Ho said recently. "It will help build tourism."

Linda Vo, an expert in Asian American studies at UC Irvine, said even though she sees a change in the community toward more openness she doubts Little Saigon will turn into another Little Tokyo, which she said has lost younger generations of Japanese-Americans. Vo pointed out that Little Tokyo is in downtown Los Angeles, and most original families in the area have moved away.

Vo said the suburban nature of Orange County, where a move from Little Saigon to Irvine or Fountain Valley doesn't make it hard for a visit to the old neighborhood. She also said the fact that Orange County is home to the largest concentration of Vietnamese outside Southeast Asia helps Little Saigon maintain its cultural authenticity.

"Demographics are so huge," Vo said. "That is a huge advantage to maintaining the ethnic identity."

On May 20, in the Asian Garden Mall parking lot, designers will unveil another possible tourist spot — the Courage to Rebuild monument.

The 16-foot totem pole-like structure, surrounded by seating and plants, is called "Of Two Lineages." Designed by Cerritos artist James Dinh, it was inspired, in part, by a Vietnamese legend about a king from the lowlands in Vietnam who marries a princess from the highlands and has 100 children.

It is, in short, the origin story of Vietnam, but it also represents Little Saigon's success.

"The continuation of Little Saigon is what we are trying to accomplish with this art project," said Alicia Jao, Frank Jao's other daughter, who spearheaded the Courage to Rebuild initiative and plans on bringing her infant daughter to the unveiling. "We want great public art that will tell the story of our culture and history but also connect us to the future."

Arlene Ho, of Tustin, hopes to be part of that future. The 23-year-old UC Irvine graduate works at a medical office and is preparing to move to western Michigan in the fall to attend medical school.

In college, she made it a point to learn about and cultivate her heritage, hanging out in Little Saigon and being the chairwoman of February's Tet Festival, hosted by the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations. As chairwoman, Ho said her goal was similar to what community leaders are pushing now in Little Saigon — bringing in more non-Vietnamese visitors.

Though she goes to Little Saigon at least once a week, she said the enclave needs to adapt to the needs of her generation and non-Vietnamese-Americans, many of whom are her friends.

"There are still a lot of businesses that don't embrace that change and some of them may be OK with that," she said.

"But we're still a young community," she added. "Things will adapt more to American culture and letting people into our little world."

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Lehman stated that he would be absent from the next Planning Commission Meeting.

Chair Brietigam mentioned that City Council voted to send the Commission a Code Enforcement review regarding commercial property maintenance issues. The Chair recommended that Commissioners take the opportunity to be involved and suggested a staff-initiated field trip to observe the properties and the organization of a threeperson committee to meet regularly with staff. Staff responded that the City's Building Official would be taking steps to review the City's property maintenance code and to contact neighboring cities in matters relating to their codes. The effort would culminate in a late summer study session. Staff explained that during the economic downturn, the focus was not on businesses, however, that vision was changing beginning with the move of Code Enforcement to be under Building and Safety. Together, staff would work in tandem on abatement. However, with limited Code Enforcement staff, whose work was reactive via complaints, in order to be proactive, the number of Code officers would need to be increased. Staff then explained that for multi-tenant shopping centers, a singular tenant application requires conditions which focus on improving the tenant's area only, and the tenant is not responsible for improving the entire shopping center.

Commissioner Lazenby pointed out the unfairness to a new tenant being held to a standard that the remainder of the shopping center was not being held to.

Chair Brietigam commented that the property maintenance code seemed outdated, for example, regarding clotheslines, however, staff clarified that though certain requirements were directed toward apartments, especially those with balconies, the code covers both residential and commercial properties.

Chair Brietigam then challenged the City Council to increase the size of the Police Department to 200 sworn by the year 2020. Commissioner Kanzler added that the number of Code Enforcement officers should increase as well.

<u>MATTERS FROM STAFF</u>: Staff gave a brief description of future agenda items for the next regular Planning Commission meeting and that a CEQA 101 Study Session would be agendized soon.



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## SB 827 Fails to Pass First Committee Vote, AB 1912 Moves to Judiciary Committee

Update on League Hot Bills

April 20, 2018

Legislative policy committees are in full swing in the Capitol and last week a number of League hot bills moved through committee hearings.

SB 827 (Wiener), one of the highest priority bills this year, failed to pass out of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee. The measure would have effectively rezoned all land within one-half mile radius of a "major transit stop" to accommodate buildings up to seven stories tall. Although the measure is not moving forward this year, the issue will remain part of ongoing discussions on how to create legislation that strikes a balance between community-based planning and state goals.

Another League hot bill, AB 1912 (Rodriguez) also had its first policy committee hearing. The Assembly Public Employees, Retirement and Social Security Committee passed the measure, which will be heard on April 24 in the Assembly Judiciary Committee. AB 1912 would apply retroactive and prospective joint and several liabilities to each originating agency of a JPA for all retirement-related liabilities. It would also mandate that a retirement agency sue each originating agency of a JPA for full liability damages, including attorney fees. Even with recent amendments, this bill remains very problematic for cities. The measures still conflicts with provisions in the California Constitution, creates funding and operational impairments, contributes to the downgrading of an agency's credit rating and will likely limit cities' ability to use JPAs as a tool to provide services.

Below is a list of additional League hot bills and an update on their progress through the Legislature.

#### **SUPPORT**

#### HOT AB 1775 (Muratsuchi) State Lands: Leasing: Oil and Gas.

Prohibits the State Lands Commission (SLC) or local trustees from entering into new lease agreements, or renewing, expanding, or modifying existing agreements that would result in increased oil or natural gas from federal waters. Status: Passed out of Assembly Natural Resources and will next be heard in Assembly Appropriations.

## HOT AB 2268 (Reyes) Local Government Finance: Property Tax Revenue Allocations: Vehicle License Fee Adjustments.

Restores funding to approximately 140 cities that had annexed inhabited territory in reliance on previous financial incentives, then suffered significant fiscal harm when those funds were swept away due to the passage of SB 89 (2011). Offers similar incentives to support future annexations of inhabited

territory to improve services to affected residents consistent with the state Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) policies. Status: Passed out of Assembly Local Government and will next be heard in Assembly Appropriations.

#### HOT AB 2812 (Limón) Data Storage and Protection Standards: Local Agencies.

Incentivizes public-private partnerships by establishing the Office of Local Cloud Migration and Digital Innovation under the purview of the California Department of Technology (CDT). The Office of Local Cloud Migration and Digital Innovation will help guide cities and provide resources to modernize IT infrastructure. Status: Passed out of Assembly Privacy and Consumer Protection and will next be heard in Assembly Appropriations.

### HOT AB 3162 (Friedman) Alcoholism or Drug Abuse Recovery Or Treatment Facilities.

Assists in maintaining residential neighborhoods as a therapeutic environment for the social integration of disabled persons, including recovering alcoholics and addicts. Reforms outdated regulations for the licensing of residential drug and alcohol treatment facilities to enable the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) to ensure compliance with existing licensing laws. Status: Passed out of Assembly Health and will next be on the Assembly Floor.

#### HOT SB 833 (McGuire) Emergency Alerts: Evacuation Orders: Operators.

Requires Cal Office of Emergency Services (OES) to ensure each city & county office of emergency management is a registered federal Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) operator and has all the software, hardware, and training to operate that system. Also requires "Red Alerts" for evacuations. Status: Passed out of Senate Governmental Organization and will next be heard in Senate Appropriations.

#### HOT SB 834 (Jackson) State Lands: Leasing: Oil and Gas.

Prohibits expanded offshore oil and natural gas production off the California coast. Would prohibit the State Lands Commission (SLC) or local trustees from entering into new lease agreements, or renewing, expanding, or modifying existing agreements that would result in increased oil or natural gas from federal waters. Status: Passed out of Senate Natural Resources and Water and will next be heard in Senate Appropriations.

#### **OPPOSE**

### HOT AB 3121 (Kalra) Evidentiary Privileges: Union Agent-Represented Worker Privilege.

Establishes union-agent represented worker privilege for a new standard of evidentiary privilege. Inhibits an agency's ability to conduct thorough investigations into allegations of misconduct. Status: Passed out of Assembly Judiciary and will next be heard on the Assembly Floor.

# League Board Elects Grass Valley City Council Member Jan Arbuckle First Vice President, Murrieta Council Member Randon Lane Second Vice President Grass Valley

The League of California Cities® board of directors held a special election in conjunction with its April 19 Board of Directors meeting in Sacramento to fill officer vacancies.

Grass Valley Council Member Jan Arbuckle was elected first vice president to serve the remainder of a vacated term. Murrieta Council Member Randon Lane was elected second vice president to complete the term vacated by Council Member Arbuckle. They will term both hold their positions until the League's Annual Conference in September 2018. South San Francisco Council Member Rich Garbarino continues to serve as president and Lodi Mayor Pro tem JoAnne Mounce remains immediate past president.

Council Member Arbuckle thanked the board after the election. "California cities have much at stake this year in the Legislature, ballot box and even the courts. Being elected first vice president is an opportunity to serve our cities and work with my colleagues throughout the state on the most significant issues facing California local governments. I became active in the League because of the strength of this organization and its voice in the Capitol and I remain committed to contributing my efforts with the League to advocate for policies that improve our cities and strengthen neighborhoods," said Council Member Arbuckle.

## Coalition Forms to Oppose Big Soda and Corporate Special Interest-Backed Initiative to Decimate Local Services

League Joints with SEIU California, AFSCME CA, California Professional Firefighters and PORAC to Lead Charge to Defeat Measure

April 20, 2018

The Committee to Protect Our Communities formed on April 18 to oppose the "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act," a misleading named and dangerous initiative sponsored by the American Beverage Association (ABA) and the California Business Roundtable.

Proponents are currently gathering signatures to qualify the measure for the November 2018 ballot. The coalition opposing this measure comprises local governments, working families, labor groups, concerned individuals and business groups.

"Libraries, parks, medical emergency response, garbage and sewer, police, fire, streets and roads. These are the essential services that would be devastated by this proposed measure that puts corporate interests over the needs of local communities and our residents. Interfering with our cities' ability to raise revenues to pay for local services is a far overreach that will hurt California's quality of life for generations to come," said Carolyn Coleman, chair of the Committee to Protect our Communities and League executive director.

To date, ABA has put <u>\$4.1 million dollars</u> into the committee in support of the initiative — well over 80 percent of the money raised so far by the proponents.

Joining the opposition coalition are a number of widely respected organizations, including the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, California (AFSCME), the California Professional Firefighters (CPF), and the Peace Officers Research Association of California (PORAC).


The "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act" would drastically limit local revenue authority. In part, it eliminates local authority to impose a tax for general purposes by majority vote and instead requires all local proposed tax increases subject to a two-thirds vote. This proposal also requires two-thirds approval of all members of the local legislative body before a tax can be placed on the ballot. It also requires that a tax contained in a regulation adopted by a state agency must be approved by two-third vote of the Legislature. For cities and other local agencies, it applies retroactively and may void some local measures approved by local voters on or after Jan. 1, 2018.

Proponents have until June 28 to qualify their initiative for the ballot.

# Governor Brown Engages League Board in Policy Discussion on City Priorities

April 23, 2018

Gov. Jerry Brown met with the League Board of Directors on April 19, in a productive meeting that touched on many of the most significant challenges for cities, including housing and homelessness, pensions and public safety.



The Governor, who is in the final months of his historic

four terms leading California, shared the perspective that he has gained in five decades of public office and acknowledged the importance of the local-state relationship. In keeping with his emphasis on fiscal responsibility, the Governor urged careful and strong stewardship of municipal resources.

League President Rich Garbarino thanked the Governor for his leadership on a number of issues including championing transportation funding and his commitment to fighting any attempt to repeal it. The Governor also recognized the complexities of issues at the local level and in reminiscing about his tenure as Oakland mayor, he remarked that things may be more difficult for today's city leaders.

# Legislative Action Day Brings Hundreds of City Officials to Sacramento to Lobby on City Priorities

Senate President pro Tem Atkins and Assembly Member Aguiar-Curry Brief City Officials Prior to Capitol Meetings

April 23, 2018

City officials descended on Sacramento on April 18 for the League's annual <u>Legislative Action Day</u> to advocate on issues facing California cities this legislative session.

In his remarks to the group, League President and South San Francisco Council Member Rich Garbarino said, "Our 120 year history as an organization and effectiveness reflect generations of dedicated California city leaders who have been inspired by public service and come together as this League to advocate for policies that strengthen our cities. Thank you for your advocacy to improve the quality of life in your city and all California cities."

President Garbarino discussed pressing city issues including affordable housing and the homelessness crisis, rising pension costs and the need for greater investments in infrastructure. He also gave an update on June and November statewide ballot measures, including the announcement about the formation of the Committee to Protect our Communities, a coalition of local governments, working families, labor groups, concerned individuals and business groups.

The coalition formed to oppose "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act," a misleading named and dangerous initiative sponsored by the American Beverage Association (ABA) and the California Business Roundtable that would devastate essential city services such as libraries, parks, emergency medical response, garbage and sewer, public safety and roads. Proponents are currently gathering signatures to qualify the measure for the November 2018 ballot.

Senate President pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) spoke with League members about her priorities as leader and the important work of California city officials. She stressed the fact that city officials gain deep expertise in the most pressing issues facing California including housing, homelessness, infrastructure, public safety and energy efficiency. The former San Diego council member reflected on her experience serving her city's residents directly.

"I love this work and I know you love this work too," said Atkins.

The passage of SB 1 last spring, which has doubled the amount of revenues cities receive for street and road repair, remains an important priority for the Senate President pro Tem. "Priority number one is to make sure we do not loose funding for infrastructure," she told the audience.

Assembly Member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, the former mayor of Winters, shared how her experience as a member of a League policy committee, as well as the League Board, was instrumental in preparing her for serving in the Assembly and as chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee.

"You don't want to forget where you came from," said Aguiar-Curry.

Before the city officials headed to the Capitol for <u>meetings with their legislators</u>, the League's lobbyists provided the city officials with updates on the <u>League's strategic goals</u> and other major issues.

### League Officers, City Manager Department Leaders Meet with CalPERS Officials

In a meeting with CalPERS leadership, President Garbarino outlined the challenges cities are facing with increasing retirement contributions and shared the League's Retirement System Sustainability Study with CalPERS CEO Marcie Frost, Board of Administration President Priya Mathur and Bill Slaton, the Board's local government representative.

Joining President Garbarino in the meeting were League First Vice President Jan Arbuckle, League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman, Jim Lewis, president of the League's City Managers Department and Pismo Beach city manager, Tony Dahlerbruch, Board director for the City Managers Department and Palos Verdes Estates city manager, and Sarah Lamnin, chair of the League's Governance, Transparency and Labor Relations Policy Committee and Hayward council member, and Dane Hutchings, League Legislative Representative.

President Garbarino called on the CalPERS Board and executive leadership to work with the League collaboratively, specifically finding ways to communicate with state and local employee groups to find common ground. "There are no easy choices for CalPERS or California cities," said Garbarino "It's important that the cities and CalPERS leadership are communicating the same message to our employee partners and to the public about the fiscal difficulties cities face — only then can we begin to find collaborative solutions to the challenges ahead."

## Legislative Panel Discussion on California's Housing Challenges and Homelessness Crisis

Following meetings with their legislators, city officials returned to the Sacramento Convention Center for <u>a panel discussion</u>, moderated by Oakland Council Member Abel Guillén, on California's housing challenges and homelessness crisis. The League's five diversity caucuses, the African-American Caucus, Asian-Pacific Islander Caucus, Gay-Lesbian-Bisexual-Transgender Local Officials Caucus, Latino Caucus and Women's Caucus sponsored the session.

The panelists who shared their perspectives were:

- Sen. Jim Beall (D-San Jose), chair of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee;
- Assembly Member David Chiu (D-San Francisco), chair of the Assembly Housing Committee;
- Assembly Member Mike Bloom (D-Santa Monica); and
- Sen. Mike McGuire (D-Healdsburg).

As the Legislature's leaders on housing legislation, they have been instrumental in shaping related bills. They all expressed their strong desire to pursue additional housing and land use legislation that address California's affordable housing crisis. Sens. Bell and McGuire reiterated their commitment to work on legislation to increase density around certain types of transit. The League has pledged to work with them in the next six months to try to draft legislation that strikes the right balance between community-based planning and state goals.

"California cities accomplished a lot of great work during Legislative Action Day. The relationships city officials have and build with their legislators are key to ensuring they understand and consider the effect their decisions have on our communities. The League appreciates that so many of our members took time to travel to Sacramento to contribute to our collective efforts to bring the voices of our cities in the Capitol," said Executive Director Coleman.
