Enclosed is the June 2018 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart (please see chart on attachment A) reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City's investment policy. As of June 2018, the City's total portfolio is invested in:

The cash with fiscal agents is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of June 2018, 6.100% of the portfolio is restricted.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner. Please call me at extension #5060 if you have any questions.



OCWD AND THE WATER INDUSTRY MOURN THE LOSS OF PHILIP L. ANTHONY - A PIONEER WHO HELPED DISPEL THE "TOILET TO TAP" MYTH AND INSPIRED THE ADVANCEMENT OF WATER REUSE PROJECTS AROUND THE WORLD

FOUNTAIN VALLEY, CA (July 30, 2018) – The Orange County Water District (OCWD) and the global water community is mourning the loss of OCWD's longest-serving board member, 1st Vice President Philip L. Anthony. Director Anthony was first elected to the OCWD Board of Directors in 1981 to represent division four which includes the cities of Los Alamitos and Seal Beach and parts of Buena Park, Cypress, Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Stanton, and Westminster. During his service of nearly 37 years on the board, Director Anthony played an important role in pioneering projects that have now become standard water industry tools to combat drought and water shortages.

"Phil was a mentor to me and many other water leaders," stated OCWD Board President Denis Bilodeau. "Under his visionary leadership, OCWD doubled the sustainable yield of the Orange County Groundwater Basin. The effect of having plentiful water for residents and businesses in Orange County cannot be understated. Phil's passing is a great loss for all of Orange County."

During the mid-1980s, Director Anthony and his fellow board members began planning the Green Acres Project that supplied non-potable water (recycled water) for golf courses, public parks and landscaping in the cities of Fountain Valley, Santa Ana, Costa Mesa, and Newport Beach. The project, which still operates today, has saved those cities a substantial amount of money. In the late 2000s, he led efforts to complete the Prado Wetlands expansion in Riverside County and construct the OCWD Advanced Water Quality Assurance Laboratory, which opened its doors in 2009 and earned full certification, among many other programs and projects.

One of his most significant contributions to OCWD and the water industry at large, was his unwavering support to build the Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS), which came online in 2008. The world's largest advanced water purification project of its kind, the GWRS takes treated wastewater and purifies it to drinking water quality. GWRS water is used to replenish the Orange County Groundwater Basin and also protect the basin from seawater intrusion. Similar projects were proposed in the 1990s in Los Angeles and San Diego but failed when opponents labeled such projects as "toilet to tap." Director Anthony, a chemist, saw wastewater as a resource and was confident that OCWD and the Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD), OCWD'S partner in this groundbreaking project, could safely transform this resource into a reliable water supply for the region.

"Water reuse was greatly politicized in San Diego and the San Fernando Valley," added Bilodeau. "Phil had

great conviction that advanced water recycling had to be part of Orange County's immediate water future. He demonstrated great political courage in rallying the OCWD and OCSD boards, local, state and federal officials and community organizations to move this controversial project forward. Outreach to educate community stakeholders about the need, safety and benefits of potable reuse began nearly ten years before the project came online and included more than 1,200 presentations. Phil personally gave a majority of those presentations."

With an original production of 70 million gallons per day (MGD), the GWRS was expanded in 2015 to produce 100 MGD and in 2018, OCWD and OCSD became the first agencies in the Western Hemisphere to bottle advanced purified water to help educate policy makers, media and the public about potable reuse. In honor of the 10th Anniversary of the GWRS, OCWD captured a poignant <u>interview</u> with Director Anthony and OCSD former chairman and current board member James Ferryman about how both agencies embarked on such a cutting-edge project.

Director Anthony served as president of OCWD from 1993 through 1995 and again from 2005 through 2007. He also served as a director of the National Water Research Institute (NWRI) (1991 to 2018), commissioner of the Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority (2003 to 2018) and was formerly chair of the Association of California Water Agencies Region 10. Director Anthony also co-founded the Water Advisory Committee of Orange County in 1983, was a founding member of OCWD's Groundwater Guardian Team in 1997 and served on the Santa Ana River Flood Protection Agency since 1988.

Director Anthony received numerous honors for his leadership in the water industry, including the 2002 E. Benjamin Nelson Government Service Award from the Groundwater Foundation. The prestigious national award honors and recognizes an elected or appointed public official who has significantly advanced environmental and groundwater stewardship. Most recently, the California Sierra Club Political Action Committee presented him with the 2018 California Taking the Lead Political Leadership Award. The award honored four environmental heroes from both political parties who have worked and voted consistently to protect the environment in Los Angeles and Orange counties.

Environmental stewardship is something Director Anthony strived to instill in the future generation. He once said that "Children today will play a vital role in preserving our natural resources in the future." Director Anthony founded the Orange County Children's Water Education Festival in 1996. The first festival served 500 Orange County students. Today, the event, co-hosted by the Disneyland Resort and NWRI at the University of California at Irvine, has grown to serve 7,000 students annually.

"Nearly 20 years before the phrase STEM emerged onto the scene, Director Anthony saw the great need to expose students at a very young age to careers in science, engineering and technology, and to environmental

issues," stated Frank Dela Vara, Director of Environmental Affairs at the Disneyland Resort. "It was truly an honor to work with him to help inspire the next generation of water and environmental leaders."

Director Anthony was first elected to the Westminster City Council in 1962, where he served until 1976. He served as the city's mayor from 1972 through 1976. He was then elected to the Orange County Board of Supervisors where he served from 1976 to 1981 and was board chair in 1979. Director Anthony also served on the boards of the Orange County Sanitation District, the South Coast Air Quality Management District, the Southern California Association of Governments, and the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission.

Earlier in his career, Director Anthony worked in aerospace engineering and program management at Rockwell International Corp., where he received a NASA Technology Utilization Award and was granted two U.S. patents. He also authored several scientific and technical publications and was widely sought out for local, national and international speaking engagements as an expert on advanced wastewater purification for potable reuse.

Director Anthony held a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry and a Master of Science degree in physical chemistry. His other community service included board president of the Westminster Boys & Girls Club and board member and past chair of the Orange County Taxpayers Association. He was also a Kiwanis Club member and president of Philip L. Anthony, Inc., practicing as a real estate developer and an independent public affairs and management consultant.

Director Anthony cherished his family. He is survived by his wife Carolyn of 51 years; daughter Dionne Anthony and son Derek and his wife Sheryl of Carlsbad, CA; and, the newest addition to the family, grandson Fitz Philip Anthony born to his son Philip and longtime girlfriend Jamie Bankus of Costa Mesa, CA. He was preceded in death by his beloved son Gregory Anthony in 2003.








ALL ABOUT AVID!



Two cities add local sales tax to ballot

Garden Grove and Seal Beach will ask residents to consider a 1 percent hike in November

Garden Grove and Seal Beach last week both added their names to a growing list of Orange County cities seeking to bolster coffers with a local sales tax.

Both will ask voters in November to approve adding a 1 percent sales tax; the revenue will go toward their operating budgets.

The two cities came to their decisions under a tight deadline — Aug. 10 is the last day to place local measures on the ballot.

Santa Ana and Laguna Beach already had placed local sales tax measures before voters in November.

Whichever cities win voter support will join five Orange County cities that already augment the 7.75 percent tax the rest of the county's residents pay with an additional city sales tax — Fountain Valley, La Habra, La Palma, Stanton and Westminster. Most requested the additional revenue stream in 2016.

California's base sales tax rate is 7.25 percent, and the state returns I percent of that revenue to cities. Orange County residents pay an additional half-percent for transportation projects.

A 1 percent sales tax could raise an estimated \$19 million annually for Garden Grove, according to a staff report. Seal Beach could see

Meanwhile, Elgin said, his department must deal with ever-mushrooming issues concerning crime, homelessness and mental

health crises.

Garden Grove Fire Chief Tom Schultz also said his department is understaffed — needing, among other personnel, four more paramedics to keep up with the demands of an aging population.

Seal Beach echoed such concerns.

"My residents don't feel safe, and this is to hire more cops," Councilwoman Ellery Deaton said.

The city's interim Police Chief Joe Miller said his department could use another nine officers.

Both cities also emphasized that without more money they will be forced to reduce maintenance of parks, medians and streets.

And, throughout California, city governments are facing budget shortfalls, in

part because of the rising pension liabilities for public workers.

Carolyn Cavecche, president of Orange County Taxpayers Association, said ballot statements for local sales taxes tend to "list all these incredible things the money will go to — hiring police officers, infrastructure, addressing homelessness, clean drinking water."

Vietnam holding SoCal man?

Orange resident and family fear the government has detained and possibly imprisoned her husband

Helen Nguyen went to pick up her husband at Los Angeles International Airport on July 16, the day he was scheduled to end a trip to his birth country, Vietnam, but he wasn't there.

Now the Orange resident, as well as other relatives and friends, fear that Michael Phong Nguyen is being detained and possibly imprisoned by the Vietnamese government.

Friends in Vietnam recently posted on social media that the American citizen had been arrested, but details about where and why weren't clear. The last Helen Nguyen heard from her husband was July 6.

Over the past two weeks, the family has contacted U.S. legislators and the Vietnamese government, as well as English-language and Vietnamese-language media, and others to raise awareness about Michael Phong Nguyen's disappearance.

'I fear for his safety," Helen Nguyen said Tuesday. "I really want my husband back. And the children want their dad back."



This is why rolled ice cream is the cool new dessert trend

One of the coolest food trends to hit Southern California recently is rolled ice cream.

Also known as stir-fried ice cream and ice pan ice cream, the dessert is created to order using an ice grill and served in a bowl topped with fruit, candy, cookies and other treats. Stores have been popping up all over Southern California, and we spoke with people who've opened shops in the San Gabriel Valley, Inland Empire and Orange County to talk about the trend and its future.

This is why rolled ice cream is the cool new dessert trend The origin of rolled ice cream is said to be traced to 2009 Thailand, and by 2015 it had hit the east coast of the United States.

That same year, Louis Kim was talking to a New York friend, who suggested that they go into the business together. Kim's idea was to take the trend a step further by tapping into the advantage of California's dairies and using organic ingredients, as well as less sugar to create his ice cream. He spent months developing recipes.

"I saw the potential," Kim said. "New York and Manhattan is for visitors, travelers, but L.A., especially Southern Californians, they're so picky for organic ingredients."

Kim opened <u>Holy Roly Ice Cream</u> in <u>Los Angeles</u> in 2017 and a second store in <u>Arcadia</u> in June 2018.

And of course there's the taste, but part of the fun of rolled ice cream is watching it being made.

After an order is placed, the "ice cream artist," as Kim calls his employees, gathers the cream base and mix-ins. The artist begins making the ice cream by crushing the mix-in ingredients, such as fruit, graham crackers or Oreo cookies, on the metal ice-pan. The ice-pan is maintained at a temperature of -15 degrees which causes the ingredients to freeze rapidly.

Once they are broken down, the mix-ins are spread evenly on the ice-pan and the cream base is poured over them. The two are blended with a spatula until the mixture begins to solidify. The mixture is then spread out on the ice-pan and pushed into a square shape. Using a spatula, the ice cream artist gradually works along the square rolling slices. The finished rolls of ice cream are placed on end in a bowl, graced with toppings and served.

"Rolling is important because it gives more texture – and it's Instagram-worthy," Kim said. "I prefer to use chopsticks (when I eat rolled ice cream) because I can really feel the layers. When you pick it up with the chopstick, you are not crushing it like with a spoon so you can chew the layers, so it is a new experience with the texture, but the problem is many people don't use chopsticks. So I changed to spoons."

Kim started Holy Roly with eight flavors and now adds a new selection every month based on suggestions from his staff or Instagram followers. His biggest sellers are Strawberry Graham, Banana Nutella and Oreo with either a vanilla or coffee base.

Holy Roly also has vegan ice cream, which presented an extra challenge for Kim to create, as the base needed to be non-dairy. Milks like coconut and almond are watery and freeze too quickly to be rolled, so he had to find other organic ingredients to help the mixture stick together while keeping the cost affordable. Currently Holy Rolly offers vegan coconut and mango rolled ice cream.

Holy Roly also serves scooped ice cream, which helps when orders for rolled ice cream get backed up. If the store is busy, it's not uncommon to have a 30-40 minute wait time for orders.

Kim believes that the rolled ice cream trend will drop off within a couple of years. There are many shops popping up all over, but he thinks people will get bored with it, like they have with frozen yogurt. For this reason, he will be adding smoothies, juices and shakes to Holy Roly's menu and is planning to eventually spread out into a range of desserts.

"I want to serve all kinds of dessert with the ice cream, like ice cream waffles, ice cream crepes, beginning with fresh ingredients," Kim said, "I want to make more healthy desserts. There are good desserts everywhere, but there's nothing healthy."

• Danny Vo, owner of <u>The Joint Creamery</u> in <u>Garden Grove</u>, said that rolled ice cream is popular because it's different in that you can watch it being made, you can create a wide variety of flavors and it usually has a fresher taste that pre-made ice cream.

"I make everything in-house from milk, cream, sugar, all the good stuff," Vo said. "I know a couple of other stores buy their bases pre-made already and add their own flavorings."

Vo says he is realistic that rolled ice cream is a trend and that the increase in shops serving it may contribute to its diminishing demand.

"My partner and I jumped into when there were no other shops around in Orange County, however, we were a little slow in our build-up and a couple of other places opened before we did," Vo said. "Most likely we're going to have to be doing other things. My partner and I have been experimenting lately and have a couple ideas. We haven't figured out what we want to do next yet."

• Moe Alshari, owner of <u>Cherry Chill</u> in <u>Ontario</u>, said that the best thing about serving rolled ice cream is seeing the customers' reactions when they watch it being made.

"We're different from many of the places that make it," Alshari said. "Here, we allow the customers to create their flavor."

Cherry Chill uses a gelato base and customers may select from a range of fresh ingredients, such as strawberries and a slice of cheesecake or their favorite candy bar, for a customized flavor.

Alshari isn't concerned about the eventual waning of the rolled ice cream trend because his shop offers a diverse range of treats, including more than 12 flavors of frozen yogurt, organic fruit smoothies, protein shakes and edible arrangements. It also serves several flavors of nondairy soft serve ice cream and will be adding a non-dairy almond milk base for rolled ice cream.

Often people come to the shop in groups so this variety is an advantage, as people want different things, Alshari said.

"You just continue to be creative and what we do here is every now and then we come up with a new flavor. I'm working on a mint ice cream made with actual, fresh mint," Alshari said.

Sales tax hike put on ballot

Measure would increase rate from 7.75 to 8.75 percent

Garden Grove voters will decide in November whether to OK a 1 percent hike in the city's sales tax.

The City Council last week voted 5-2 to put the tax proposal on the ballot. The city's sales tax is 7.75 percent. City officials, facing a multi-million dollar budget crisis, say increasing it to 8.75 percent would generate about \$19 million a year.

It would also prevent cuts to public safety and other services, said Mayor Steve Jones.

"We as a council need to know how our residents would like us to proceed," Jones said. "If the voters assert they're not willing to support a measure, we will carry out their will by cutting services... in order to balance the budget."

Mayor Jones and City Council members Kris Beard, Thu-Ha Nguyen, Kim Bernice Nguyen and John O'Neill voted for the measure. Council members Phat Bui and Stephanie Klopfenstein voted no.

City Councilman Bui said there is no guarantee that the city will use the extra money to hire police officers and other public safety personnel.

"How do we know that this will be translated to a lot more sworn officers" and firefighters and paramedics? Bui asked.

In order for the measure to pass, a simple majority of voters — or 50 percent plus one — would have to vote "yes."

The Republican Party of Orange County came out against an increase.

"While the sponsors of this tax increase have downplayed the financial impact this will have on residents, the passage of this proposal is simply not feasible for the voters of Garden Grove," said the Party, in a formal statement. "Garden Grove has an amazingly diverse economy and thriving engine of commerce that is put at risk by this tax increase."

City officials are calling the ballot item the Garden Grove Public Safety/9-1-1 and Vital City Services Measure. The measure reads:

"To provide effective 9-1-1 emergency response by preventing cuts to police/firefighter/paramedic staffing levels; maintain neighborhood police patrols/gang/drug prevention; protect local drinking water supplies; repair streets/potholes; address homelessness; support affordable housing options. and protect vital city services, shall the City of Garden Grove establish a one-cent sales tax providing \$19,000,000 annually until ended by voters, requiring annual independent audits, citizens oversight, all funds used locally?"

City officials say the budget crisis was caused by massive employee pension costs, by the State of California taking local tax dollars, and by other dynamics outside of local control.

The city has cut costs in the past decade, according to a staff report provided to the City Council.

"The city has faced financial challenges since the recession in 2008," the report stated. "In order to combat those challenges, the city and City Council have been proac-

tive in addressing the problem by making significant cuts in operating costs, including: Reducing full-time staff from 687 to 643; implementing a two tiered retirement structure; requiring all city employees to contribute to their own retirement ranging from 8 percent to 12 percent; reduced healthcare subsidies for city employees..."

The City Council is looking at shutting down the city's Fire Department, and contracting with the county for fire services, which would save millions every year, officials say. Other departments have been asked to reduce their budgets by 5 percent.



These bold coyotes should not be tolerated or enticed, but given the message that they should not be so brazen.

Hazing is a method that uses deterrents to move an animal out of an area or discourages an undesirable behavior or activity. Hazing can help maintain coyotes' fear of humans and deter them from neighborhood spaces such as backyards and playgrounds.

Hazing methods

Using a variety of different hazing tools is critical because covotes can habituate to individual items, sounds and actions.

-Yell and wave your arms while approaching the coyote

-Use noisemakers

Use projectiles

-Try other repellents (e.g. hoses, water guns with vinegar water, spray bottles with vinegar water, pepper spray, bear repellant or walking sticks)

Dog-walking tools

There are several tools for repelling coyotes that you can carry with you while walking your dog. Of course, remember that you should always walk your dog on a leash. If you see a coyote, either pick up your dog or place him or her behind. you before hazing the coyote. Then:

-Blow a whistle or air horn at the covote

-Squirt a squirt gun at the covote

-Yell and wave your arms

 -Use a homemade noisemaker. such as pennies in a sip cup or soda can

-Pick up sticks or rocks and throw them towards the covote

In your yard

Keeping pets and pet food inside is the best way to keep coyotes out of your yard. If you do encounter covotes, all of the above methods can be used in your yard. First, try the "Go away coyote!" method (yell and wave your arms as you approach the covote). You can also squirt the coyote with your garden hose or a squirt gun or bang pots and pans together.

Remember...

-Never run away from a coyote

-If the covote does not leave at first, continue approaching him and/or increase the intensity of your hazing until he runs away. If he runs a short distance away and then stops and looks at you, continue hazing him until he leaves the area completely

-If a coyote returns after you have successfully hazed him or her, continue to haze the coyote as you did before. It typically takes only one or two times to haze a coyote away for good

-Contact authorities and do not interact with a coyote you suspect of being sick or injured. Although covotes are skittish by nature and generally are not aggressive towards people, engaging animals who are sick or injured can result in unpredictable behavior

Tips for success

-Hazing is most effective when an individual coyote is hazed by a variety of people using a variety of tools and techniques

-A coyote who is being hazed must be able to recognize that the potential threat is coming from a person. Therefore, hiding behind a bush and throwing rocks or hazing from inside your car is not effective

-You can use hazing techniques and tools for one animal or multiple animals. There is usually a dominant animal in the group who will respond, and others will follow her lead

-Do not stop hazing after it is successful. Coyotes or their pups could return to their unacceptable habits or behaviors if you stop

-Share this information by teaching your family, friends and neighbors how to haze coyotes too. The more people that get involved in hazing, the more quickly you will see results



Leo Zlaket: leader, cook, community icon

If there's one institution in Garden Grove that connected the community's early rural days to its busy and crowded present, it was Zlaket's Market on Main Street, a family business established in 1927.

Generations of locals made weekly or even daily stops at that small but mighty store, going in to buy meats, cheeses, soda pop and a myriad of other things.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/retorts.jpg)When it closed down on Nov. 26, 2014, long-timers in town had reason to mourn. This week, Leo Zlaket, the last owner of the market, passed away, giving us all more reason to wear the black crepe in our hearts.

Leo was 77 when he died, and in that too-short life, he saw the city's downtown change from the center of a modest agricultural town to the historic heart of an urban metropolis. In those years, he worked and led, fed us, swept up and swapped tales. Stepping into Zlaket's was a bit of time travel, with the glowing Purex clock on the back wall and Nesbitt orange soda in a cooler near the door.

I didn't know Leo as well as some, but nearly every encounter with him was pleasant and rewarding. We bought our Thanksgiving turkeys from him and his wife Virginia. If you needed some exotic cheese, he would find a way to order it. If you wanted to hear the latest buzz on Main Street (originally Euclid Street), well, he would have some of that for you, too. No extra charge.

He was a modest man who appreciated the ironies of life and didn't mind poking a little fun at himself. We often exchanged non-heroic stories about our stints in military reserve units.

One that stood out was what he called "The Battle of Watts." A cook for a National Guard unit on its way to a field exercise at Camp San Luis Obispo, his whole convoy was turned around midway and sent south to help restore order during that riot in the summer of 1965.

Appropriately enough for a chef, he found himself standing guard with an M-1 rifle outside a Ralphs supermarket. As the saying goes,

all gave some.

As the city changed and buying habits changed, Zlaket's found its place in the 21st century economy getting more and more tentative. Toward the end, the market was kept open as much as a gift to the community as it was as a business.

Like his market with its neon sign and blue awning, Leo Zlaket was a gift to the community as well. He helped see it through breakneck change and good and bad times. Together with Virginia and their son, David, the family donated more money and volunteered much more time than their share.

It's said that Leo loved Garden Grove. It's fair to say that a lot of Garden Grove loved him back.

Don't Shift Liability and Cost to Cities for Wildfire Damage in Our Communities

Yountville Mayor John Dunbar Testifies before Joint Committee

July 26, 2018

Yountville Mayor John Dunbar testified before the <u>Wildfire Preparedness and Response Conference Committee</u> during its first hearing on July 25 to urge members to carefully consider any policy that would shift new liability to cities or make it harder for cities to collect damages caused by wildfire.

With last year's unprecedented extended wildfire season and the fires burning this year, there has been increased focus on fire safety and prevention. Legislators introduced more than 70 bills this year to address fire-related policies and earlier this month, Senate President pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) and Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood) convened a 10-member joint conference committee to work on the complex issues related to wildfires.

Sen. Bill Dodd (D-Napa) and Assembly Member Chris Holden (D-Pasadena), chairs of the committee, opened the hearing by outlining the issue and setting the stage for a discussion about wildfire patterns, prevention and damages. Prior to public comment, legislators heard experts on three major topics:

- Wildfires, Utilities and Climate Change;
- Ensuring a Safe and Reliable Electric Grid; and
- Recent Fiscal and Policy Actions on Wildfire Response and Recovery.

League Leadership on Fire Issues

The League is part of a coalition that has called on the Gov. Jerry Brown and Legislature to increase funding for fire prevention, resiliency and preparedness and mutual aid in this year's budget. The policy discussion currently underway in the Capitol addresses these issues plus the question of liability and who is responsible for bearing the costs of damages caused by fire.

The Governor on July 24 released a proposal that would change the liability standard for all utilities, bolster wildfire mitigation planning for investor-owned utilities, and update the California Public Utilities Commission authority to assign penalties to investor-owned utilities. While the League is still reviewing this proposal, the organization generally opposes changing the liability rules.

Under the current law of inverse condemnation, if a utility is found to be the cause of a fire, it pays for the damages resulting from that fire. The rule comes from the Taking Clauses in the federal and state constitutions and it applies to government entities as well. The League supports maintaining the standard of inverse condemnation for investor-owned utilities that requires utilities to pay damages.

The League opposes reducing the inverse condemnation standard for incidents caused by a utility, whether retroactive or otherwise, and supports ensuring local governments can recover applicable damages.

Representing the League at this week's hearing, Mayor Dunbar took the opportunity to talk with legislators about the fiscal implications to cities from changing the current liability rules.

"Asking local governments to shoulder new costs when our cities and residents are the victims of catastrophic disasters is not the right policy decision. It is critical that the committee understand the implications of shifting liability to cities making it harder for us to collect damages resulting from fires caused by utilities," explained Mayor Dunbar.

Next Steps

This was the first in what is expected to be a series of informational hearings held by the conference committee. While the date of the committee's next hearing has yet to be set, legislators return for the final few weeks of the legislative session on Aug. 6 and work on these issues will continue.

Cities Have until Aug. 27 to Oppose New Cannabis Regulations that Undermine Local Authority to Ban Deliveries

July 30, 2018

Proposed Bureau of Cannabis Control (BCC) <u>regulations</u> released in July would preempt cities' local control and regulatory authority in several ways.

The regulations would authorize cannabis businesses to deliver in any jurisdiction and reduce the amount of time cities have to determine the validity of a cannabis business license. If approved, the regulations formally adopt the emergency regulations BCC implemented in December 2017. Cities have until Aug. 27 to voice opposition to this problematic proposal.

Proposed Regulation Details

Under the proposed regulations, cannabis deliveries would be authorized in any jurisdiction within California. This preemption of local authority goes against the intent of voters who passed Proposition 64 in 2016. By preempting a local jurisdiction's ability to allow or ban cannabis deliveries, a critical part of the local enforcement model of cannabis legalization is removed by effectively opening up all jurisdictions to having cannabis delivered to their front doors.

In addition, these proposed regulations create a 10-day "shot clock" for cities to respond to the BCC's inquiry of the validity of either an annual or temporary cannabis license. Under current law, cities have 60 days to determine if a cannabis license is indeed valid. This 10-day "shot clock" does not afford cities sufficient time to review license applications and respond to the BCC. The rushed timeline would favor those who may intend to skirt local requirements rather than comply with them. It also undermines a fundamental pillar of Prop. 64 safeguarding that local jurisdictions can regulate cannabis in their communities. Ensuring that a local jurisdiction has approved of either a temporary or annual license is key to promoting public safety and should not be reduced to an over-the-counter approval process.

Take Action, Oppose Proposed Regulations

Cities should review the proposed regulations and oppose them prior to the Aug. 27 deadline. There are two ways for cities to take action.

The League has formally submitted a <u>letter in opposition</u> to the forced authorization of cannabis delivery and 10-day shot clock provisions and created a <u>sample opposition letter</u> for cities.
