OBJECTIVE

To report on the performance rating for the Garden Grove Housing Authority.

BACKGROUND

The SEMAP (Section 8 Management Assessment Program) Certification represents the Housing Authority's performance for the fiscal year 2018-2019. Construction News Week of September 2, 2019

Crews have started upgrading the underground sewer system on 4th Street with trenchless pipe replacement activities. Parking restrictions, road closures and detours will be in place in two-block segments, with work generally moving from west to east. In order to complete the sewer replacement as quickly as possible, there will be several days in a row that will run two shifts with both day and night work activities scheduled within each two-block segment. Notices will be provided to property owners and tenants for the night work.

Sewer installation work along the project route also continues, with work generally moving from west to east. Sewer installation activities include excavation, trenching, installation of sewer pipelines, and road work and restoration. Sewer installation work requires temporary parking and lane restrictions.

Crews will continue to perform water pipeline work and storm drain installation work along the project route, which requires temporary lane and sidewalk restrictions.

Access will be maintained for all residents and businesses.

For specific work activities in your area, see the segment overviews and maps below. All scheduled activities are weather permitting and are subject to change. No construction activities are scheduled to occur on September 2 in observance of Labor Day.



SEGMENT 1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Intersection of Harbor Blvd. and Westminster Ave. to Raitt St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 1 construction activities will include:

- Preliminary work at the site of the future Maintenance Storage Facility
- Excavations within Pacific Electric Right-of-Way (PEROW) for guideway installation
- · Excavations at Westminster Avenue, near PEROW. A temporary pedestrian detour will be maintained




SEGMENT 2 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Raitt St. to Parton St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 2 construction activities will include:

- Potholing and water pipeline work on Santa Ana Boulevard, from Raitt Street to Flower Street
- Water pipeline work at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Bristol Street
- · Storm drain installation on Raitt Street, from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard

Storm drain installation will require a temporary closure of the northbound lane on Raitt Street from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard. Both northbound and southbound traffic on Raitt Street will be shifted to the southbound lane. Temporary parking restrictions on Raitt Street will also be in place from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard.




SEGMENT 3 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

- Water pipeline work and hydrant installation at Sasscer Park

SEGMENT 4 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES


Ross St. to Mortimer St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 4 construction activities will include:

- Trenchless sewer pipe replacement on 4th Street, from Broadway to Main Street
- Sanitary sewer installation at the intersection of 4th Street and Broadway

Crews have started upgrading the underground sewer system on 4th Street with trenchless pipe replacement activities. Parking restrictions, road closures and detours will be in place in two-block segments, with work generally moving from west to east. In order to complete the sewer replacement as quickly as possible, there will be several days in a row that will run two shifts with both day and night work activities scheduled within each two-block segment. Notices will be provided to property owners and tenants for the night work.

Sewer installation work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on 4th Street. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.



SEGMENT 5 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Mortimer St. to SARTC

Over the next two weeks, Segment 5 construction activities will include:

· Sanitary sewer installation from Garfiled Street to Santiago Street

Sewer installation work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.

About the Project

OC Streetcar is the first modern streetcar project to be built in Orange County and will serve Santa Ana's historic and thriving downtown, which includes federal, state and local courthouses, government offices, colleges, an artists' village and a thriving restaurant scene. Expected to begin carrying passengers in 2022, it will operate along a 4.15-mile route that connects the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center (SARTC) and a new transit hub at Harbor Boulevard and Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 3 of Part 3 of Division 9 of the Streets and Highways Code, Sections 8320 et seq., the City Council is authorized on its own initiative to initiate proceedings for vacation of public streets that are no longer necessary for current or prospective public street purposes or as a non-motorized transportation facility;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 8312, the City Council is authorized to vacate all or a portion of a public street within

SECTION 4. It is the Intention of the City Council to reserve easements for existing public utilities per Section 8340 of the Streets and Highways Code.



Garden Grove sees its downtown





California Supreme Court Rules in Favor of City in Inverse Condemnation Case

Last week, the California Supreme Court issued a <u>decision</u> rejecting an inverse condemnation claim against the City of Oroville stemming from a sewage backup into a dental office that occurred in 2009.

The dental office asserted that the backup was caused by a partial blockage in the city's main sewer line, which forced sewage down their private lateral and into the toilets, drains and sinks of their office, causing damage.

The city acknowledged the partial blockage, but maintained that the damage to the dental office would not have occurred if the office had installed a backwater valve on their private lateral, as required by the city's municipal code.

Claims for inverse condemnation arise from article I, section 19 of the California Constitution, which provides that a public entity must fairly compensate private property owners when it "condemns" private property for a public use.

Thus, private property owners can file a claim seeking compensation for damages to their property resulting from a public improvement.

The policy underlying this doctrine is to distribute the loss to the damaged property owner throughout the community that enjoys the benefit of the public improvement that caused the damage.

However, courts have acknowledged that this policy must be balanced against the concern that "compensation allowed too liberally will seriously impede, if not stop, beneficial public improvements because of the greatly increased cost."

To accomplish that balance, the California Supreme Court held that inverse condemnation liability will arise only where the private property damage is substantially caused by an inherent risk in the design, construction, or maintenance of a public improvement.

The Court found that was not the case here, where the damage could have been avoided had the dental office complied with the "ordinary planning code requirement" in the city's municipal code.

Had the backwater valve been installed, the Court noted, the sewage would have escaped through the manhole immediately upstream of the blockage, as it was designed to do.

The Court's conclusions are consistent with those urged by the League in its <u>friend-of-the-court brief</u>, drafted by Timothy McWilliams and Blithe Bock of the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office.

Several other organizations joined in the League's brief, including the California Joint Powers Insurance Authority, the Public Entity Risk Management Authority, the California Special Districts Association, the California Association of Joint Powers Authorities and the California Sanitation Risk Management Authority.

The Court's decision is a positive development for cities and other public agencies as it confines inverse condemnation liability to the "inherent" risks associated with public improvements, and affirms the ability of cities to rely on private property owners to comply with reasonable requirements in order to reduce those risks.

League-Sponsored Measure to Jumpstart Construction of Affordable Housing Passes Assembly Appropriations - SB 5 Now Heads to the Assembly Floor

The Assembly Appropriations Committee announced on Friday, August 30, its decision to pass SB 5 (Beall, Mcguire, Portantino) and send the bill to the Assembly floor for a vote.

This was a key win for this important bill, which would create an ongoing, sustainable source of funding for affordable housing construction, and would make the state a long-term funding partner with cities across California to immediately build affordable housing.

Following the vote, League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman released a <u>statement</u>: "We urge all Assembly members to pass this important legislation to help fund affordable housing to address homelessness and the shortage of housing for low-income families," said Carolyn Coleman, executive director of the League of California Cities.

"In communities throughout the state, cities simply do not have enough affordable housing available to low- and very- low income households. We need more supply and to do that, we need ongoing and sustainable funding."

"SB 5 creates a much-needed partnership between the state and local governments. We will work with the broad coalition of labor, local government, business, housing and other advocates to encourage the Assembly to pass this vital legislation."

SB 5 gives cities and counties the opportunity to utilize property tax revenues to advance state-approved priority projects. These projects must include infrastructure investments that support affordable housing; promote urban infill development near major transit centers; and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Dear Senator Beall and Senator McGuire:

The League of California Cities is pleased to support your SB 5 (Beall/McGuire), the Local-State Sustainable Investment Incentive Program.

This measure would incentivize cities throughout California to identify innovative solutions to address the housing crisis while also supporting other State policy objectives. The League commends you for recognizing the diversity of California cities and acknowledging the flexibility cities need to spur housing construction and revitalize communities.

Since the elimination of redevelopment agencies in 2011, the Legislature has created several new tools that use tax increment financing, which include the formation of enhanced infrastructure financing districts (EIFD), affordable housing authorities, and community revitalization investment authorities (CRIA). While these new tools can be useful to local agencies, they are widely viewed as lacking sufficient financial capacity compared to what existed under former redevelopment agencies. The limited funding has resulted in few cities taking advantage of these new tools.

SB 5 would create a local-State partnership to provide up to \$2 billion annually to fund State approved affordable housing, infrastructure, and economic development projects that also support State policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, expand transit oriented development (TOD), address poverty, and revitalize neighborhoods.

With a projected multi-billion State budget surplus for the 2019/2020 fiscal year, the League believes the time is right for the State to restore more robust financing mechanisms that support local efforts to build more affordable housing, provide essential infrastructure, and create opportunities in underserved communities. The League applauds your leadership in this effort and we look forward to working together on this important issue.
