OBJECTIVE

To provide the City Council with information regarding the new "Meet on Beach" special event being held on Sunday, November 17, 2019, and highlight the City of Garden Grove's participation.

BACKGROUND

The City of Garden Grove will be one of seven cities that are connected by Beach Boulevard to participate in an innovative new street festival called "Meet on Beach," which will span the 21 miles of Beach Boulevard, beginning in the hills of La Habra and stretching to the sands of Huntington Beach. The seven cities include Huntington Beach, Westminster, Garden Grove, Stanton, Anaheim, Buena Park, and La Habra. These cities are part of the Renew Beach Boulevard Coalition, whose mission is to reimagine State Route 39 as a more walkable and bikeable street, and reinvigorate the economic vitality of the historic thoroughfare.

DISCUSSION

Each city will host its own unique special event connecting the seven communities together in one day, in an effort to activate its own tens of thousands of residents. "Meet on Beach" will promote an active lifestyle, with bike and pedestrian-friendly activities, live performances, food, and giveaways at pop-up events along Beach Boulevard.

The Community Services Department is partnering with the Police Department to stage Garden Grove's leg of the event, which will be held at Wakeham Elementary School, 7772 Chapman Avenue, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. A 'Safety Moves City' interactive exhibit will teach kids how to walk and bike safely in their community. The Community Liaison Division will also host a booth with giveaways, as will the Office of Community Relations. Other community booths include the United States Census 2020 and the Orange County Healthcare Agency.

Additionally, attendees can climb a rock wall, try their luck at over-sized lawn games, listen to a local DJ, dine at food trucks, tackle an interactive inflatable obstacle course, and get artsy at a pop-up art station. Opportunity drawings include a Great Wolf Lodge stay, and an electric scooter, courtesy of Papa Wheelie Bicycles, in Garden Grove.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Each participating City will be reimbursed \$5,000 in event costs from a SCAG Go Human program grant fund, consisting of two sources: a Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) and CalTrans' Active Transportation program (ATP).



Governor Newsom Signs Criminal Justice Bills to Support Reentry, Victims of Crime, and Sentencing Reform

AB 1076 creates an automated record clearance system for low-level offenses

AB 484 ends a mandatory minimum for certain drug crimes

SB 22 speeds up rape kit processing on new cases, preventing future backlogs

AB 917 expedites the victim certification process for the purposes of obtaining T-Visas or U-Visas

SACRAMENTO – Governor Gavin Newsom today signed 25 bills aimed at setting a path to reform California's criminal justice system. The bills include support for those

reentering the community after serving their sentences, including creating a system to automatically expunge records of individuals previously convicted of low-level offenses, as well as reform unfair sentencing practices, and enhance support for victims of crime.

"I am signing more than two dozen bills that give hope to those that have earned a second chance in our communities, and also support victims of crime," said Governor Newsom. "These bills show a new path to ensure our state moves closer toward a more equitable criminal justice system."

One of the bills signed today is AB 1076 by Assemblymember Phil Ting (D-San Francisco), which will create an automated record clearance system for qualifying low-level offenses, so an individual's records can be sealed in a more efficient manner, as is their right pursuant to California law. Under AB 1076, the California Department of Justice will establish the automated record clearance system for individuals arrested or convicted after January 1, 2021, and will replace the current one, in which individuals must petition directly to the court. The new system will exclude registered sex offenders and those with any pending criminal charges.

"People shouldn't have to pay for their mistakes for the rest of their lives. A fresh start improves an individual's chances of succeeding and reduces the likelihood of recidivism. Automating the record clearance process will enable former offenders to get back on their feet and lead productive lives," said Assemblymember Ting. "Our economy and society pay the price when job-seeking workers are shut out."

"Many Californians living with past criminal records have completed their sentences and paid their debts, yet still face thousands of legal prohibitions preventing eligibility for jobs, housing and many other keys to family stability and economic mobility," said Lenore Anderson, president of Californians for Safety and Justice. "It's time for meaningful rehabilitation. By signing this bill, Gov. Newsom is giving people living with old records long overdue relief and a real path to stability -- and that is better for public safety and the economy. With this new law, California is emerging as a national leader in reintegration for families and strengthening communities."

Other criminal justice related bills signed today include:

Release and Reentry

- AB 278 by Assemblymember Kevin McCarty (D-Sacramento) allows the California Conservation Corps to accept applicants who are on parole.
- AB 1261 by Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer (D-Los Angeles) eliminates the requirement for individuals convicted of a certain drug offense to register with local law enforcement.
- SB 310 by Senator Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley) permits a person with a felony conviction to serve on a jury, unless they are on any form of supervision for a felony conviction, or are a registered sex offender.
- AB 1668 by Assemblymember Wendy Carrillo (D-Los Angeles) establishes the Education and Employment Reentry Program within the California Conservation Corps and authorizes the director to enroll formerly incarcerated individuals.

Supporting Victims

- AB 917 by Assemblymember Eloise Gómez Reyes (D-Grand Terrace) further expedites the victim certification process for immigrants, including when the victim is in removal proceedings, for the purposes of obtaining T-Visas or U-Visas.
- SB 22 by Senator Connie Leyva (D-Chino) requires law enforcement agencies to submit rape kits to a crime lab or other rapid turnaround DNA program within 20 days.

- SB 375 by Senator Maria Elena Durazo (D-Los Angeles) extends the deadline for victims of violent crimes to file an application for compensation from three years to seven years.
- AB 433 by Assemblymember James Ramos (D-Highland) requires a hearing in open court before early termination of probation, and for crime victims and their attorneys to be made aware of early termination of probation.
- AB 415 by Assemblymember Brian Maienschein (D-San Diego) authorizes the California Victim Compensation Board to compensate a crime victim for the costs of temporary housing for a pet and for any pet deposit that may be required for relocation.
- AB 629 by Assemblymember Christy Smith (D-Santa Clarita) authorizes the California Victim Compensation Board to provide compensation equal to loss of income or support to victims of human trafficking.

Youth Offenders

- AB 1394 by Assemblymember Tom Daly (D-Anaheim) eliminates the imposition of any fee charged by a superior court or probation department to an applicant who files a petition to seal juvenile court records.
- SB 394 by Senator Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley) authorizes a court, in consultation with the prosecuting entity and the public defender, to create a pretrial diversion program for defendants who are primary caregivers of a child under 18 years of age.
- AB 965 by Assemblymember Mark Stone (D-Scotts Valley) authorizes the secretary
 of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to allow persons
 eligible for youthful offender parole to obtain an earlier youth offender parole
 hearing by earning certain educational merit credits, subject to CDCR regulations.
- AB 1423 by Assemblymember Buffy Wicks (D-Oakland) establishes a process for juvenile offenders to request to return their case to juvenile court.
- AB 1454 by Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer (D-Los Angeles) increases the award amounts available through the Youth Reinvestment Grant Program and allows nonprofit organizations to apply for grants through the program.

Sentencing

- SB 136 by Senator Scott Wiener (D-San Francisco) removes the 1-year sentence enhancement that is applied to current sentences for each prior felony jail or prison term served.
- AB 484 by Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer (D-Los Angeles) removes a mandatory minimum sentence for certain drug crimes, allowing for judicial discretion in imposing any period of confinement.
- SB 36 by Senator Robert Hertzberg (D-Van Nuys) improves transparency for pretrial risk assessments by requiring regular validation of assessment tools and requiring the Judicial Council to publish a yearly report on its website with data related to outcomes and potential biases.
- AB 1618 by Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer (D-Los Angeles) prohibits plea bargains that require a defendant to generally waive unknown future potential benefits of changes in the law that may occur after the date of the plea.

Additional legislation

- AB 1331 by Assemblymember Rob Bonta (D-Alameda) addresses data gaps and improves access to criminal justice data by establishing reporting requirements across the system and clarifying existing law regarding access.
- AB 45 by Assemblymember Mark Stone (D-Scotts Valley) prohibits CDCR and city and county jails from charging inmates a co-pay for medical visits.

- SB 399 by Senator Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) requires the appointment of two members of the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training who are not peace officers and have expertise in implicit and explicit biases, cultural competency, mental health and policing or work with vulnerable populations.
- AB 1215 by Assemblymember Phil Ting (D-San Francisco) prohibits law enforcement from installing, activating, or using a facial recognition system in connection with a law enforcement agency's body-worn camera.
- AB 1600 by Assemblymember Ash Kalra (D-San Jose) shortens the notice requirement in criminal cases when a defendant files a motion to discover police officer misconduct from 16 days to 10 days.

Other criminal justice items the Governor undertook this year included an <u>Executive</u> <u>Order</u> halting executions in California, which he announced in March.

He also <u>announced earlier this year</u> that the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's Division of Juvenile Justice would shift to the Health and Human Services Agency beginning July 1, 2020.

NOTICE OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY'S REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF ITS CARBON-FREE SURPLUS ENERGY TRANSACTION WITH BONNEVILLE POWER ADMINISTRATION

APPLICATION NO. A.19-10-001

On October 1, 2019, Southern California Edison (SCE) filed its application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting approval for a "proof of concept" carbon-free transaction to test a model of energy conservation transfer through the purchase in California of surplus carbon-free energy around the clock (ATC) hydropower from Bonneville Power Authority (BPA) and sourced from BPA's energy efficiency achievements. The transaction is proposed for a three-year period through the end of 2021.

The "proof of concept" transaction seeks to explore whether there is a viable market for hydropower from the Pacific Northwest derived from incremental energy efficiency (EE) savings that can be imported without increasing emissions in other parts of the Western grid. The clean energy imported from BPA will be sold on the California Independent System Operator (CAISO) market, and therefore will be available to all market participants. Lessons learned from the transaction are expected to benefit all California load serving entities by providing information about how to potentially scale up and create a larger market for "non-traditional" energy supply. SCE will submit a final report that includes, but will not be limited to, information concerning the total megawatt hours of energy delivered by the transaction, (2) the total amount of incremental emissions reductions attributable to the transaction, and (3) information on BPA's incremental EE savings based on BPA's reported EM&V efforts; and (4) lessons learned.

ESTIMATED IMPACT OF THIS REQUEST ON ELECTRIC RATES

This "proof of concept" transaction is expected to cost a total of approximately \$9 million in today's dollars over a three-year period through the end of 2021. Some of the costs are expected to be offset by revenues SCE earns by bidding the hydropower into the CAISO market. The incremental cost of the transaction is expected to be approximately \$2.989 million. The transaction could lead to a market in California for this type of product, thereby helping

California meet its ambitious carbon-reduction goals without increasing emissions in the Pacific Northwest, as required by California law.¹

If the CPUC approves this application, it will result in an estimated average rate increase of 0.03% over the three-year term of the transaction from 2019 through 2021.

This application will be assigned to an Administrative Law Judge (Judge) who will determine how to receive evidence and other related documents necessary for the CPUC to establish a record upon which to base its decision. Evidentiary Hearings (EH) may be held where parties of record will present their testimony and may be subject to cross-examination by other parties. These EHs are open to the public, but only those who are parties of record can participate.

After considering all proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process, the assigned Judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt SCE's application as proposed, modify it, or deny it. Any of the five CPUC Commissioners may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon at a scheduled CPUC Voting Meeting.

The Public Advocates Office (CalPA) may review this application on behalf of SCE's customers. CalPA is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. CalPA has a multi-disciplinary staff with expertise in economics, finance, accounting, and engineering. \$30-million-plus development expected to change aesthetic of Stanton, GG and WM

The final touches are being put on the \$32 million Village Center development at Beach Boulevard and Garden Grove Boulevard.

The development features an In-N-Out Burger, Panda Express, Planet Fitness, Chase Bank and much more.

In-N-Out Burger and Planet Fitness, among others, are open. Developers expect everything to be up and running by February 2020.

"I think this is going to bring a breath of fresh air to the area," said Stanton Mayor David

Shawver added that the center could bring in "several million dollars" to city coffers on a yearly basis.



Gem Theatre winner makes you laugh, and cry

"Bright Star is my gift to you because this show touches my soul, and I haven't felt like this in years" - Damien Lorton, One More Productions Co-Founder

There are all kinds of musicals – musicals that make you laugh, musicals that make you cry, musicals that make you contemplate life, and then there are those that make you do all three... Steve Martin and Edie Brickell's "Bright Star" is that musical. Steve Martin has made a name for himself as an outrageously funny comic, but there is another side to Martin; he is also a true polymath and beloved entertainer who speaks volumes through his multilayered creative artistry.


Bright Star is unexpected, graceful, and quiet-spirited in a melancholy sort of way. The Grammy Award-winning Bluegrass album "Love Has Come to You" was a collaboration between Martin and Brickell which ultimately became the inspiration for the duo's venture onto the bright lights of Broadway.

Based on a true story, Bright Star tells the tale of love, loss, and redemption against the backdrop of North Carolina and the Blue Ridge Mountains in two wistful periods of time – the 1920s and the 1940s.

At the end of WWII, straightforward and rather prim literary agent and editor Alice (Nicole Cassesso) meets young soldier Billy (Brandon Taylor Jones), an aspiring writer. While his writing needs work, the two form a connection that eventually leads to life-changing events.

In a clever and well-orchestrated scene, Alice swaps both costumes (and decades!) onstage, and the audience then discovers that Alice was once a free-spirited and carefree girl who fell in love with a sweet hometown boy, Jimmy Ray (Nick Seigel; the heat

Meet on Beach aims to bring new energy to Beach Boulevard

Cities will throw block parties to ditch old notions for a day of fun

From Huntington's surf all the way up to landlocked La Habra, it'll be one big Beach party.

On Nov. 17, bikers and walkers will claim a swath of Beach Boulevard during Meet on Beach, a series of free street fairs in La Habra, Buena Park, Anaheim, Stanton, Garden Grove, Westminster and Huntington Beach.

The seven cities that the 21-mile thoroughfare ties together constitute the Renew Beach

Boulevard Coalition, which aims to shake off old conceptions — vacant lots, seedy motels and prostitution — and bring new energy to one of Orange County's busiest streets.

The event will close a 1.5-mile stretch of Beach Boulevard to northbound traffic between and Orange Avenue in Anaheim and La Palma Avenue in Buena Park from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. Other cities will host their events at various public spaces.

Festivity times in each city vary

— La Habra's starts first at 9 a.m.
and all will wrap up by 2 p.m. Organizers expect 2,000 to 5,000 attendees.

Attractions that day will include fitness demonstrations in La Habra, food trucks and music in Buena Park, Folklorico dancing Anaheim and an inflatable obstacle course in Stanton.

Farther south, there will be lawn games in Garden Grove, a bike rodeo in Westminster and more food and music at the street's terminus in Huntington Beach

"It's meant to bring out positive energy and showcasing what could be in the future," said Hannah Brunelle, associate regional planner with the Southern California Association of Governments. The regional planning body has helped organize the day of events.


Meet on Beach is being paid for by a \$140,000 grant, Brunelle said, with each city also contributing staff time.

Beach Boulevard has been undervalued for a long time, but the seven-city Renew Beach Boulevard Coalition now is trying to turn that image around, said Joel Rosen, community development director for Buena Park.

Ideas include branding the street with new signs, mile markers showing distance from the ocean and improving "walkability," Rosen said. That includes providing more shade and attractive businesses, but starts with adding sidewalks to sections of the street where there are none.

"You can't make it walkable if you don't have a sidewalk," he said.

The Orange County Transportation Authority and Caltrans are surveying the public through Oct. 26 for ideas on improving all modes of transportation along Beach Boulevard. Suggested answers include adding pedestrian bridges, having bus-only lanes and building light rail lines.

Group sues Santa Ana and Garden Grove over potential golf course development

A community organization representing residents in Santa Ana and Garden Grove sued both cities Monday, seeking to stop the sale of a large open parcel of land where residents want to see parks, community centers and affordable housing.

The nonprofit Orange County Communities Organized for Responsible Development, known as OCCORD, filed a lawsuit against the cities in Orange County Superior Court.

Garden Grove owns the 102-acre Willowick Golf Course, which is across its border in Santa Ana. The cities are considering 12 proposals recently submitted to redevelop the land when the golf course lease ends next year.

Neither city has made the proposals available to the public.

Earlier this year, Garden Grove and Santa Ana provided three "vision concepts" as guidelines to cre-

 A stadium, which would take up half the land.

A "district" with a large corporate tenant and a cultural or educational center.

 A a tech or agriculturefocused campus with possibly "creative and flexible office spaces" surrounded by small "pocket" parks.

On their websites, officials from both cities wrote that they came up with the plans after seeking public input and organizing community workshops.

But local residents. backed by community organizations, said there has been a lack of transparency and communication.

"I live one block away and the first I heard of it was when an OCCORD member knocked on my door," said Robert Escandon, a Santa Ana native who joined the for public land to be priori-

Willowick Coalition, a group of residents and community groups looking to enon the golf course be community-centered and not a means to gentrify the area.

Byron Lopez, whose family rents in the nearby Santa Anita neighborhood, said that Rise Up Willowick members surveyed almost 325 homes surrounding the golf course and found that "the vast majority had no idea of what was being planned for our community."

"This is unacceptable for such a large plot of land whose development could have damaging results for our community. This is public land and the public should have a direct say in its development," Lopez

With the Willowick Golf Course as a dropback, Escandon and Lopez were joined by other residents and attorneys Monday morning at the adjacent Cesar Chavez Campesino Park, where they announced the lawsuit.

The lawsuit alleges Garden Grove and Santa Ana violated the state's Surplus Land Act, which calls

recently created Rise Up tized for affordable housing and open space uses, such as public parks.

Garden Grove officials sure that any development said that the Surplus Land Act does not apply to the commercial golf course, which the city bought in 1964, "because the land is not surplus, it has never been surplus, nor ever held as surplus by the city of Garden Grove."

> "While the city of Garden Grove has received various proposals, its staff is still in the process of reviewing the proposals and no decision has been made," Garden Grove spokeswoman Ana Pulido said in an email late Monday. "At the same time, the city of Garden Grove is aware of the passage by the State Legislature last month of (Assembly Bill) 1486, which amends the Surplus Land Act to require public agencies to first declare land surplus prior to disposing of any property after Jan. 1, 2020.

> "While the city of Garden Grove is still reviewing whether it would apply to commercial property owned by Garden Grove outside its jurisdictional boundaries, the city would likely comply with its requirement."

AB1486, which awaits document."

Gov. Gavin Newsom's signature, amends the state law to expands a local agency's requirements in an effort to create more affordable housing.

Meanwhile, officials in Santa Ana said their city is not obligated to comply with the law because the city doesn't own the Willowick property, according to the lawsuit.

Santa Ana City Manager Kristine Ridge said Monday she could not comment because she had not yet seen the lawsuit.

The lawsuit asks the court to order that the cities rescind their requests for development proposals and halt any other actions to sell the properties, until they both comply with the state law and offer the land first for open space use or to affordable housing developers.

"Only if nobody wants to buy it for a park or affordable housing, can the city sell it for a profit," said attorney Brian Olney, of the Pasadena-based Hadsell Stormer Renick & Dai law firm.

In Santa Ana, 64% of households are considered "rent-burdened," paying more than 30% of household income on rent, the lawsuit notes. In Garden Grove, more than 30% of households are in the same situation.

Meanwhile, both cities are considered "park poor" under state standards. In Garden Grove, 1% of city land is used for parks and recreation, and in Santa Ana, it's 4%, according to the lawsuit.

"They have a dire shortage of parks," Olney said. "And this is among the last open parcels of its kind being offered for sale. It's outrageous."



Register for Pre-Conference Activities Arrive early to be part of the policy committee meetings or take the AB 1234 Ethics Training starting at 9 a.m. City Clerks can earn an extra CMC/MMC Advanced Education Point by attending their City Clerks Workshop that morning as well. If this is your first time attending the conference join us at a special orientation at 12:45 p.m.
- 2. **Download the Mobile App** Have quick access to the conference schedule by downloading the League's app, and build your own itinerary! This handy tool is free to download and is available on all mobile devices. Check your app store and search for 'CaCites' or 'League of California Cities'. In addition to viewing the conference lineup, you can view session descriptions, speaker information, and materials and save your thoughts on the session all directly in the app.
- 3. Plan to Attend Your Department Meeting If you have never been to a department meeting at the League's annual conference, you are missing out. Department meetings are made up of your colleagues in similar professions throughout California. Attendees gather to discuss the issues they are facing, hear timely legislation updates and ultimately find common ground which propels their work on unified department goals, setting the course for positive change within their communities. Mayors and council members, city managers, fire chiefs, public works officers, personnel and employee relations managers and fiscal officers have department meetings on Wednesday at 11 a.m. City clerks meet Wednesday morning during their workshop, and city attorneys will meet Thursday morning during a City Attorney Track session.
- 4. Review the Session Descriptions and Bookmark the Session Materials Page The line-up of sessions may be hard to choose from; take some time the week before the annual conference and pick from 45 options. Take it a step further and connect with colleagues you

are going with to split up the most popular ones and plan to discuss what you learned following the conference.

All sessions materials will be posted as they are received by the League on the mobile app (see #3), or online at www.cacities.org/2019acmaterials. Staff highly recommend that you bookmark the session materials page to easily pull up the presentations you will see.

Extra pro-tip: reviewing the materials is also an excellent way to decide if you want to attend a session!

- 5. Pack Your Business Cards and Save Time for Connecting This conference is not just about the presentations. There are loads of opportunity for connecting at scheduled events such as the Host City Reception, CitiPAC Leadership Reception, diversity caucus events, and division events. Between structured activities, you will certainly find yourself meeting and exchanging ideas with people from across the state. Make a plan for who you want to meet in advance and don't forget a stack of business cards.
- 6. Register for Your Division Event Each region of California has unique challenges, and the League's 16 Regional Divisions meet during the annual conference and provide an opportunity for members to share and reflect on issues impacting their region. City officials, both elected and professional staff, work closely with the League regional public affairs managers to develop and carry out grassroots activities. For information on your division event, contact you regional public affairs manager www.cacities.org/regionalmanagers.
- 7. **Review the Annual Conference Resolutions** Policy development is a key part of the League's legislative effectiveness. Annual Conference Resolutions are one way that city officials can directly participate in the development of League policy.

Resolutions must focus on direct municipal issues of statewide importance and can be submitted by any elected or appointed city official, individual city, division, department, policy committee or the board of directors. Resolutions for 2019 were due to the League on Aug. 17. All resolutions and background information are available at www.cacities.org/resolutions. A petitioned resolution can also be introduced during the annual conference to address any late-breaking issues.

Resolutions will be considered up to three times during the conference: at policy committee meetings, during the General Resolutions Committee meeting, and at the closing session/general assembly.

Each city council designates a voting delegate to represent your city during the general assembly. Your city may also appoint up to two alternate voting delegates who may vote in the event that the designated voting delegate is unavailable. If you are a voting delegate or

- alternate, make sure to check in at the Voting Delegates Booth in the main lobby of the convention center when you arrive in Long Beach.
- 8. Visit the Member Services Desk Members of the League have access to a wealth of information and opportunities to get involved better their communities. Visit the Member Services Desk in the League Pavilion on the Expo floor to get information on League services available to you and your city.
- 9. **Find Exhibitors, League Partners, All in the Expo!** The League's Annual Conference & Expo is the largest premiere event in California that connects city officials with organizations and businesses that support municipal activities. With over 260 exhibitors, the expo floor is a must-stop destination during the conference.
 - In addition to the exhibitors, attendees will find a special zone for the League Partners. An exclusive Speakers Theater is located in the League Partners Pavilion.
 - Cities receiving a 2019 Helen Putnam Award can also be found on the expo floor. Stop buy their booths and pick up some exciting ideas to take back to your community.
- 10. Pack Smart and Plan for Getting Around Attending any conference can be exhausting. You'll be walking to the convention center to attend your department meeting, navigating between captivating speakers at the general sessions and breakout sessions, cruising through the Expo, and out to dinner with colleagues, then back to your hotel. You will be thanking yourself later for planning now. Pack comfortable shoes, chargers for mobile devices and bring a water bottle that you can refill at water stations during the conference.
